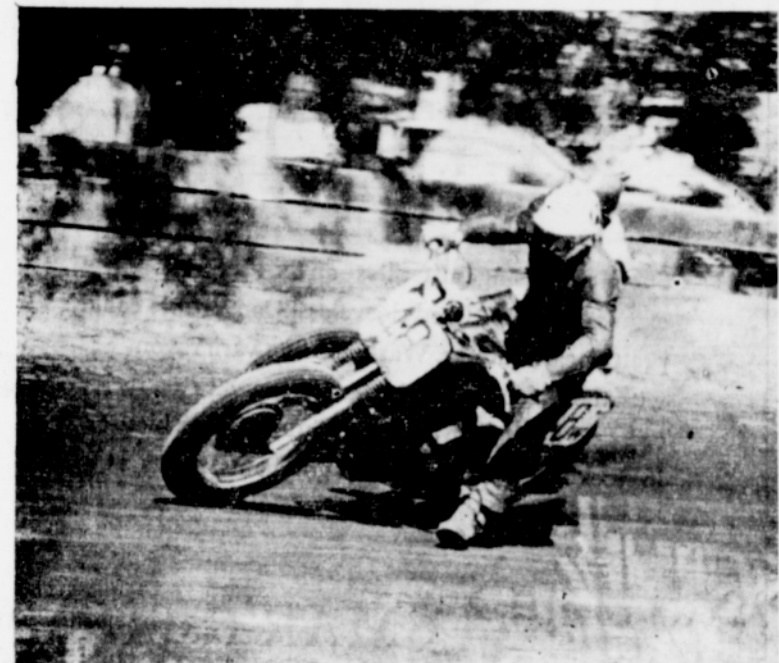

Calapooya Archers Win at Medford

Five members of the Calapooya Bowmen of Cottage Grove participated in the "Field Shoot" (tournament), held at Medford Sunday, June 5, and entered in the 28 field and 28 animal target events.

Cottage Grove winners in the field events for medals were Harold Hodges, who took second place in the mens free style, and Sharon Bush, winning second place in the womens free style events.

In the two events, the field targets are placed at distances varying from 10 yards to 80 yards from the shooting line, with a possible 20 points per target for the 28 targets at the respective distances. CG Centennial Sports Program To Offer Attractions for All

Besides the usual fun-filled festivities of a hundred-year anniversary, such as Kangaroo Courts, observance of antique ordinances, whisker growing contests, wearing of old pioneer apparel, etc., Cottage Grove's Centennial, July 2-10, has scheduled such a variety of sporting events to attract every type of sports enthusiast imaginable.

Kicking off the celebration, July 2, will be the Cottage Grove Centennial Golf Championship, which continues through July 4. The tournament is open to all amateurs, with the 18-hole qualifying round July 2. The 80 qualifiers will then play three 9-hole matches July 3, with the 18-hole finals slated July 4.

It is hoped that the \$300 in prizes will attract enough city champions from over the state to give the local champ, Bob Gasper, some competition.

Archers Meet

At the same time the Oregon State Archers Association's 28th annual tournament will be held at the Dorena Dam Recreation area. The three-day event, beginning July 2, will give the opportunity to men, women, juniors intermediates and beginners to take part in such contests as aquatic field shoots, flights, target events, team shoots, novelty shoots and clouts. Visitors are welcome to watch.

Also slated for July 4 are motorcycle races at the rodeo grounds, with championship riders from all over the Northwest to participate. Trophies will be awarded for the Trophy Dash, Expert Main, Amateur Main, Novice Main and consolation, with a \$300 pay-off for 3-star TT.

Sports fans have a two day "breather" before the Logger's Jamboree, to be held Thursday evening, July 7. Featured in the Jamboree will be log rolling, tree climbing, axe throwing, falling and bucking contests and a tug-of-war, all pitting loggers from the east and west sides of the Coast Fork of the Willamette River against each other.

Fish Released

The next day, July 8, anglers will have a chance to pit their skill against the wily trout at Dorena Dam, where approximately 2,000 trout will be released by the State Game Commission.

In charge of the fish release will be the Cottage Grove Rod and Gun club, which also plans an "open to the public" trap shoot that evening. The shoot features a 50 bird "choose your partner, backer - upper," with cash purse prizes, and the 50 bird Hileman Handicap.

Cottage Grove Riding club's ninth annual rodeo, July 9-10, will wind up sports and Centennial events. The professional rodeo is offering a purse of \$1,250, in addition to the entry fees. Highlighting events of the rodeo will be calf roping, bareback bronc riding, and a home run clout by Wicks.
