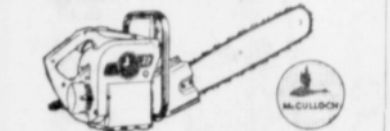

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Army Order, Dated 1876 Explains "Type Writer"

WASHINGTON — In an era when the typewriter has become standard military equipment, a directive unearthed recently in the Army's Office of the Quartermaster General reads like the museum piece it is.

Dated September 9, 1876, signed by the "chief clerk," and addressed to the "principle clerks" in the then Quartermaster General's Office, the circular states:

"The Quartermaster General desires that use be made of the type writer. The principle clerk of each branch of this office will therefore please designate some one person under his direction to take

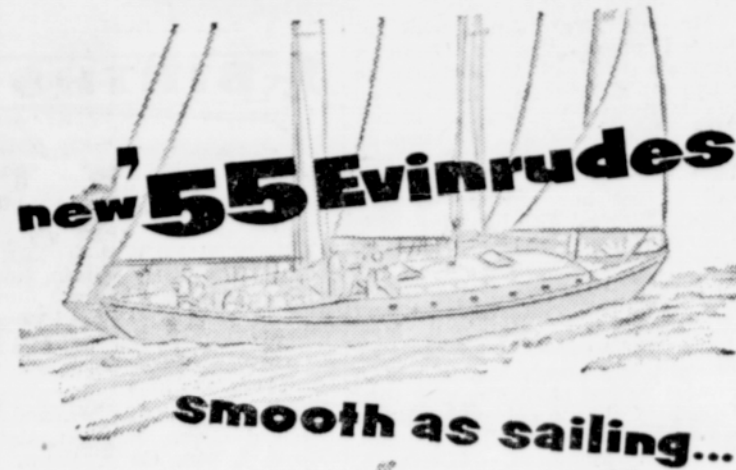
charge of a type writer, and by practice become familiar with and proficient in its use in order that all letters, not mere forms, and products of each branch, may be printed by it."

The directive was written by hand in pen and ink.

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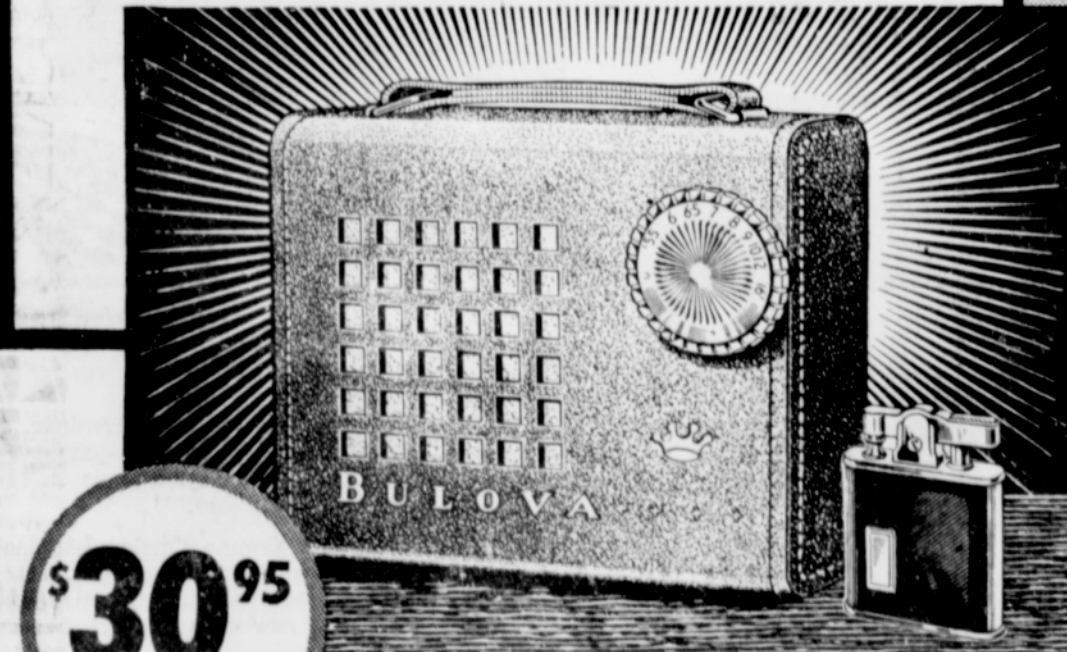


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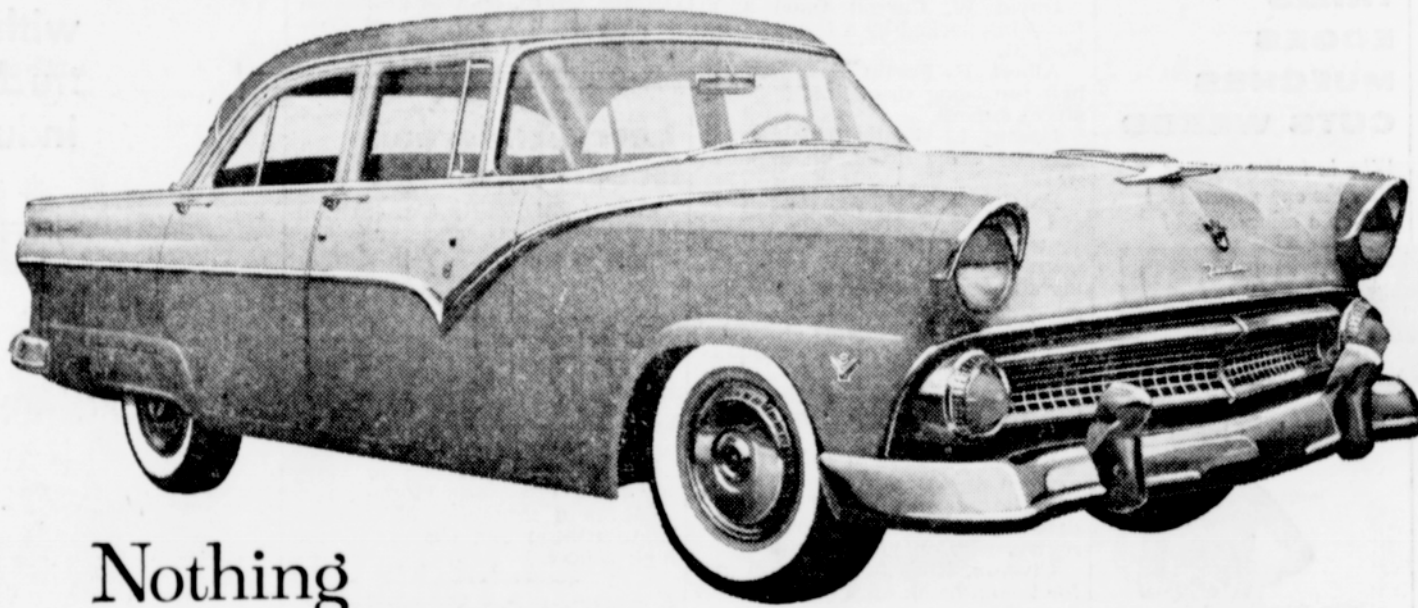
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
