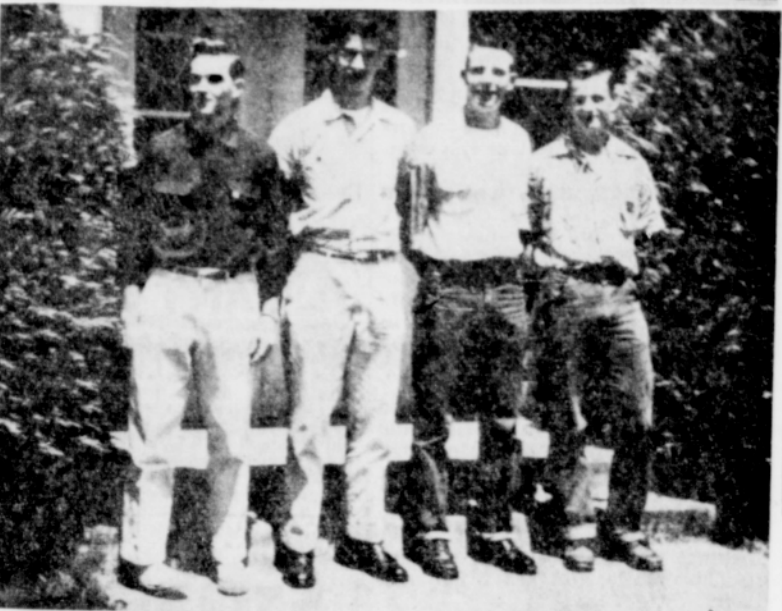
Mrs. Robert Raymond and son are spending a couple of weeks with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bob Owen, while her husband is at National Guard camp.

State Roads Needs Set at \$1 Billion

A good roads program similar to the one proposed by the President's advisory committee on highways to solve America's traffic muddle would mean the expenditure of \$1,072,100,000 on Oregon's roads during the 10-year span of the program.

A Bureau of Public Roads breakdown of traffic needs pointed out that \$319 million should be spent during the next 10 years on interstate highways, \$333 million on primary roads, \$106 million on secondary roads and more than \$300 million on non-federal-air roads and streets. The federal share would be \$479 million.

"The worst traffic problems are on main highways and in cities, but some indication of the state's needs can be shown from the fact that there are still more than 24,000 miles of unimproved roads in the state," said G. R. McElhany, vice president for this area of Universal C.I.T. Credit Corporation, one of the largest automobile financing firms. C.I.T. has been a leading advocate of a stepped-up highway program for many years.

"The nation's roads are overcrowded today with some 160 million persons traveling 557 billion miles a year in motor vehicles," he said. "By 1965, they will be traveling 814 billion miles a year. Obviously, we must find a way to speed up our federal, state and local road building programs."

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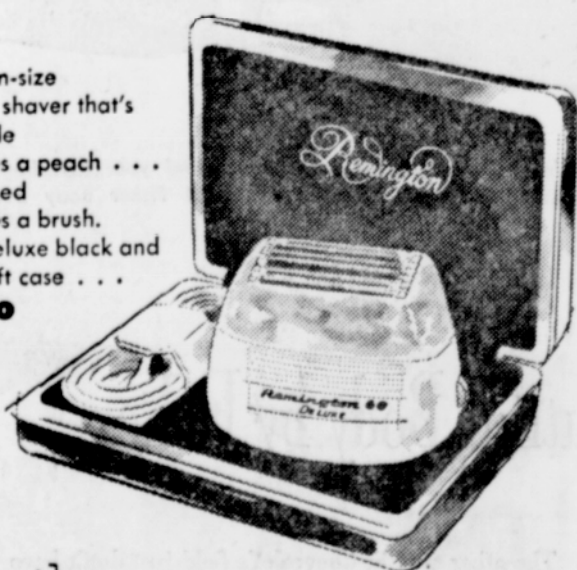
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
