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Grove City Hall to House Soil Conservation District Office

Headquarters for the newly formed Upper Willamette Soil Conservation District is now located in the council room of the City Hall in Cottage Grove. Dr. H. A. Hagen, chairman of the Agriculture committee of the Chamber of Commerce, announced that John Mead, conservationist, will be in charge of the work and will be assisted by T. A. Bown, soil scientist and J. L. Newcomb, field engineer. All will live in Cottage Grove.

Mead, 31, came here from Harrisburg, where he had charge of the Linn - Lane conservation district for the past four years. He was born and raised in Idaho, served 2½ years in the Army Air Corps in the Pacific area and graduated from Utah State Agricultural College in 1950. He has a wife, Violet, and two small sons.

Newcomb, 42, came here from the Yakima Valley in Washington where he was employed as field engineer with the Bureau of Reclamation for the past three years. Prior to that, he worked with the Federal Department of Agriculture in Oklahoma for seven years. He is married and has six children, two of whom are still home.

Bown graduated from Oregon State College, after which he was with the Soil Conservation Service in the State of Washington. He then spent several years working with the Farm Crops Department at Oregon State College before coming to Cottage Grove. He is married and has three children.

Soil Conservation Districts are local groups of farmers organized for the purpose of conserving their soil and water resources. They are not to be confused with Drainage Districts, Irrigation Districts, Water Control Districts, or an organization of the federal government. They have no power to tax, levy bonds, or make assessments. Supervisors (farmers) serve without pay.

A Soil Conservation District provides assistance to farmers without cost in the following ways:

Assistance Given

Farmers are provided with their own organization to promote conservation and to work with all agencies concerned with conservation and good use of soil and water resources, both public and private.

It provides farmers with soil surveys and information on their farms that helps them in making the best use of their land.

Detailed conservation information for their farms is provided to farmers as the individual farmer requests it.

Technical assistance is provided farmers in soils, farm crops, engineering, etc., on their conservation problems as they need and ask for it.

People in the Willamette Valley are indicating they want technical and engineering help on such problems as laying out tile systems for drainage, designing open drainage systems, building irrigation dams, planning irrigation systems, staking out contour farming and sod waterways, improving drainage outlets, building of dikes, controlling streambank erosion, flood control on small watersheds, proper land management, proper application of irrigation water, soil fertility problems, erosion control, crop adaptation of each soil, pasture management, proper land use, wildlife improvement, etc.

This service is made possible by Oregon Conservation Districts. Law, which is farmer voted, farmer organized and farmer administered.

Anne Hill Named Co-Chairman Of Seabeck Meeting

Centennial Prizes Listed in Paper

A list of the eight major and 41 additional merchandise prizes to be given away from the sale of Centennial buttons, topped by a three-day, all expense paid trip for two people to San Francisco, via Shasta Daylight, will be printed in the Centennial Section of this week's issue of The Sentinel.

Drawing for the prizes will be held Saturday July 9, from 7 to 9 p.m. All holders will not have to be present at the drawing to win a prize and those not present will be given two weeks to claim prizes. However, if prizes are not claimed within that time, a re-drawing will be held.

Some buttons were sold without the corresponding pink coupons, with the name and address of purchaser, being filled out. These buttons have just as good a chance as the others to win, as ALL stubs will be placed in the drawing cage. Stubs with no name or address have a number corresponding to that of a button. When the numbers are drawn, button holders will be required to show their button.

Woodard Lbr. Co. Among Successful Bidders at Auction

A bid of \$61.25 per thousand board feet for Douglas fir was received by the Eugene Forest District Office of the Bureau of Land Management at the regular monthly sale held June 16, 1953. This is the highest price per thousand received in the history of the Eugene district. Zip-O-Leg Mills was the successful bidder for this tract which contained 1,320,000 board feet of Douglas fir appraised at \$21.95 per thousand with an additional volume of 23,000 board feet of hemlock and 45,000 board feet of western red cedar.

Altogether six tracts of timber, with a total volume of 10,831,000 board feet, were sold by oral auction bid for a total of \$527,007.70. This represents an increase of \$190,609.70.

The successful bidders on the other five offered tracts were as follows: W. A. Woodard Lumber Co., one tract containing 2,690,000 board feet at \$55.50 per thousand for Douglas fir; Zip-O-Leg Mills, one tract containing 1,478,000 board feet at \$56.00 per thousand for Douglas fir; The Long-Bell Lumber company, one tract containing 828,000 board feet at \$50.30 per thousand for Douglas fir; The Long-Bell Lumber company, one tract containing 900 board feet at \$41.00 per thousand for Douglas fir; Gibson & Son, one tract containing 313,000 board feet at \$40.50 per thousand for Douglas fir.

Mr. Virgil T. Heath, State Supervisor of the Bureau of Land Management, from Portland, attended the sale.

There will be a weekly sale of six tracts containing 1,364,000 board feet of salvage timber on June 23, 1953 in Hall A, Carpenter's Building, 507 Willamette St., Eugene, Oregon.

The next regular monthly sale will be held July 14, 1953, in Room 12, New Post Office Building, 520 Willamette St., Eugene, Oregon.

Hickok Places 8th In State Road-e-o

Craig Hickok, winner of the local Jaycee Road-e-o, placed eighth in the state contest, held Saturday afternoon at the Portland Speedway. A field of 42 entered the event.

Out of a possible 625 points, Hickok netted 350 for the eighth spot. There were only 11 points difference between the first nine contestants, according to Hickok, with the first place winner, Roy Simmons of Park Rose High School in Portland, netting 561 points.

Hickok won third in this event last year. The ninth place contestant was placed second last year.

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Average Annual Day-Use of Lookout Point, Dexter Dams Expected Higher Than Grove, Dorena Reservoirs Combined

The average annual day-use attendance at Lookout Point and Dexter reservoirs on the Middle Fork Willamette River is expected to be more than 80,000, according to Colonel James U. Moorhead, Portland District Engineer.

The two projects, completed at a cost of \$89,000,000, will be dedicated by the Honorable George H. Roderick, assistant secretary of the army, on Saturday, June 25. The dedication program will begin at 2 p.m.

Colonel Moorhead said that the average annual attendance for the five-year period, 1949 to 1953, at Fern Ridge, Cottage Grove and Dorena Dams were 132,000, 50,000 and 25,000, respectively.

Most of these were day-use visitors from local areas, he said, with usage at Fern Ridge closely resembling that of a municipal park.

Bed Fire Sees Near Death Sat.

Smoking in bed nearly cost the life of James Raines, 803 North 9th, Saturday as he was pulled from his smoke-filled home overcome by smoke and toxic gases from a bed fire.

According to Fire Chief Ernest Shipley, who pulled him out of the house, Raines went to sleep after lighting up a cigarette, setting the bed afire.

The chief, making the initial investigation of the alarm, found Raines huddled and unconscious in a corner of the living room. He was pulled out of the building and recovered consciousness without further aid.

There was little damage to the building, owned by Faye McLaughlin. Raines sustained minor burns.

The program wound up Wednesday when Lt. Col. Ben C. Lamb, ambassador to Korea from the UN, gave a talk on the aid from Red Cross Chests.
