Sporting Activities for Grove Centennial Are Drawing Near

Sports activities for Cottage Grove's Centennial, July 2-10, are drawing near, with planning for the many events in the final stages. Kicking off the sports program, July 2, will be the Cottage Grove Centennial Golf Championships and the Oregon State Archery Association's 28th annual tournament, both of which last through July 4.

President Dwight D. Eisenhower has just written that he will be unable to participate in the golf championships.

The golf championship is open to all amateurs, with the 18-hole qualifying round July 2. The 80 qualifiers will then play three 9-hole matches July 3, with the 18-hole finals slated July 4. Nine holes and 3,250 yards long, the local course is in excellent condition. Large oak and fir groves, good architecture, plus two water holes, make the course a challenge for the best of golfers and entertainment for the higher handicapped.

Cottage Grove nabbed the lead in the third frame, when Mullen, Wicks, Harris and Benson, with the aid of a double and triple, crossed home plate.

Tucker, Mullen and Harris, minus the one run by Roosevelt, increased the CG Midget's margin, 7-3, in the fourth inning. Roosevelt cut the lead in the next frame with two markers to Grove's one.

Three singles and a three-bagger in the final frame netted Grove three more markers. Roosevelt again cut the lead, but not enough, in the last inning, when Riggins belted a bases loaded homer.

A correction in last week's article should read that No. 50 came in first in the trophy dash, not fourth as was stated.

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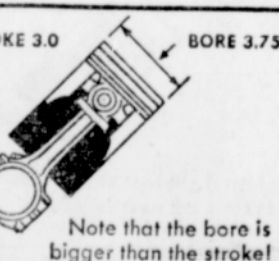
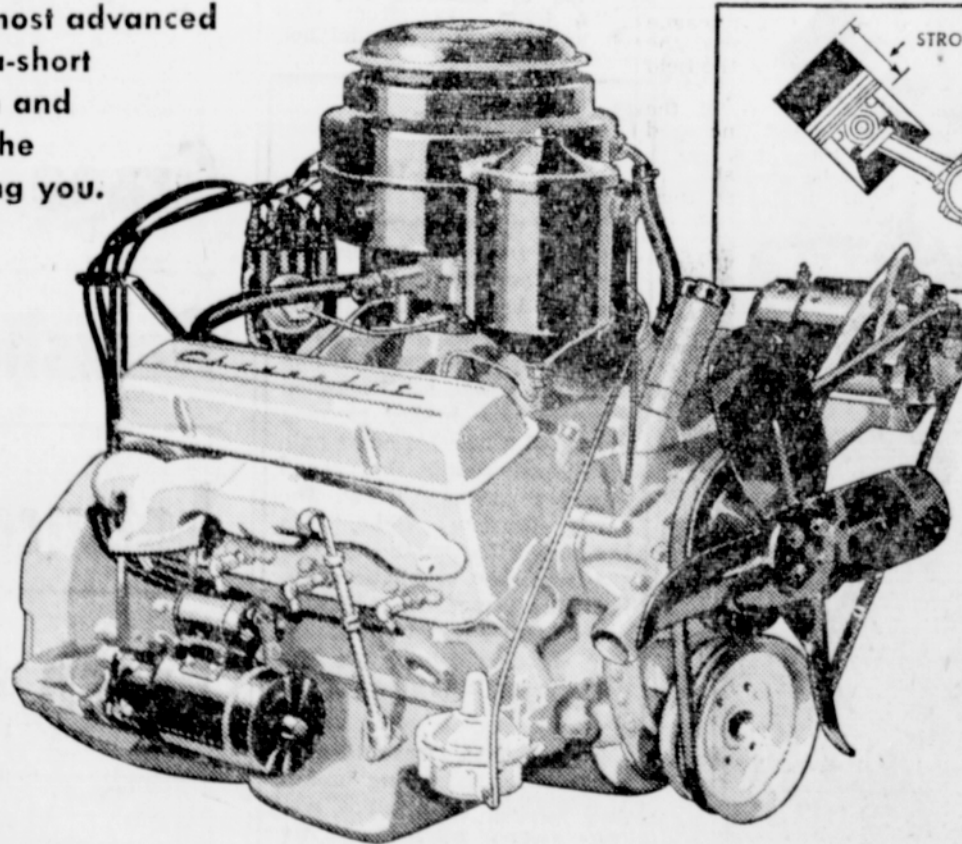
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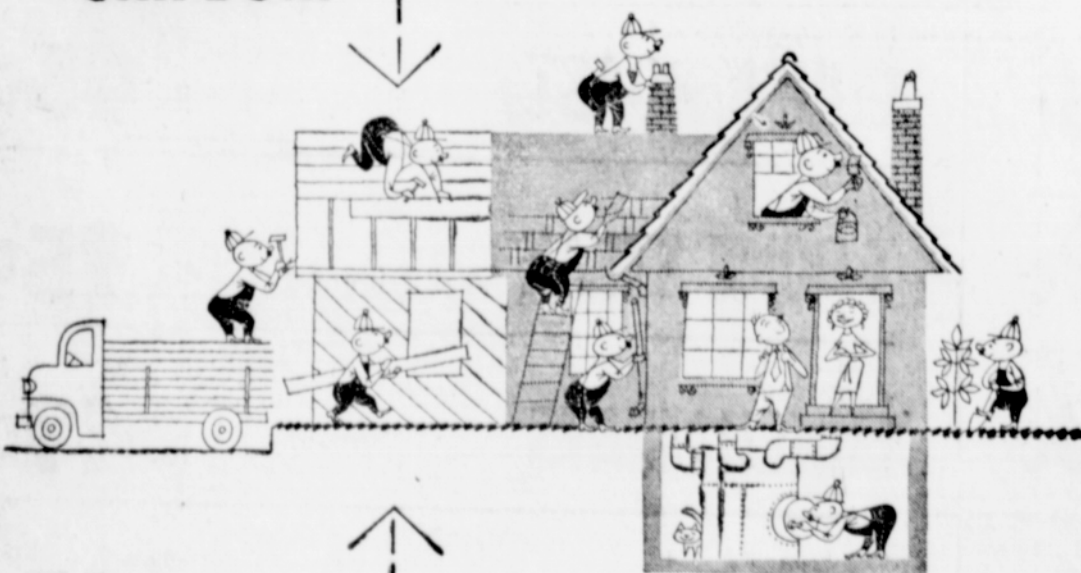
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
