

Gaspar Defeats Champ in OGA Golf Prelims in Portland Tues.

Bob Gaspar, city golf champ of Cottage Grove, defeated Eddie Simmons Tuesday as match play opened in the 27th match play championships of the Oregon Amateur Golf Open, held at River-side Golf and Country club in Portland.

Gaspar's victory over Simmons, defending champion, was the major upset of the day. He turned back Simmons, 4 and 3, by winning the first three holes of the back nine. Simmons won the OGA crown last year at his home course, Medford's Rogue Valley Country club.

Will tee shots cost Simmons his chance to repeat. Three times his drives wound up under trees and he was forced to forfeit a stroke by chipping out. He was 1 up after four holes, but Gaspar took the sixth for the divider and won the ninth with a par four to go 1 up at the turn.

The husky Grove divotter shared the tenth with a par five when Simmons treed his drive and won the 11th with a six-foot birdie putt and the 12th when Simmons again had tree trouble. They halved the next three holes to end the scrap.

Big Game Refuges Now Abolished

On a move designed to permit greater flexibility in the management of Oregon's big game herds, the legislature in its recent session, abolished all big game refuges. Statutory refuges eliminated include Canyon creek, Deschutes, Steen mountain, Gross mountain, Oregon cove, Salt creek, Cow creek, Burnt river, Myrtle Park, Prospect, Mule Deer, Corvallis watershed, Mt. Emily, Three Sisters, Warners, Ochoco and the Willowa mountain sheep refuge.

These refuges, most of which were created in the years from 1921 through 1933, had outlived their usefulness. As a matter of fact, most of them had been opened to hunting during regular big game seasons for several years. Some severe game management problems have arisen because of the existence of certain refuges, particularly in the eastern part of the state. On the west side the abundance of cover provides adequate protection for the big game animals.

The Oregon State Game Commission has been using and will continue to use a system of temporary closures where necessary to meet big game management needs. The effects of protection from hunting are usually apparent in three to four years.

The legislature also abolished the Umatilla county state game bird reservation and the Umatilla

county state game refuge, neither of which were serving the purpose for which designed.
