Gus Heinrich Named Oldest Merchant

Gus and his comment in walking into his store was "Vel, man alive, you haven't got nuffins. Now how are you going to sell anything when you haven't got it?" Gus replied that he knew he didn't have stock but he didn't have the money to buy it. The outcome of the call was that the salesman gave Gus between four and five hundred dollars worth of watches on consignment, to be picked up on his next trip through, but when he called again, Gus had sold the entire amount and ordered more.

In telling of the first automobile that Gus saw in Cottage Grove, he related the following story: One day Wallace Sanford came rushing into the shop and said to look up and come over on the east side as there was an automobile over there. Half the town was around the auto and while Gus couldn't remember the make, he thinks it had a lever instead of a steering wheel.

When asked about the fire department in those old days, Gus had this to tell: The fire bell was right across the street from his shop - the street being no more than a trail. About 10 o'clock one night Gus saw a bright light out west, across in back of the Masonic Temple building and saw that Bert Willard's house was afire. He ran over and rang the fire bell and it wasn't long until Fred Reider came. Of course, there was no fire truck in those days, they used a two-wheel cart with a single hose.

The cart was built for about six men to pull it, but on this particular night, Fred and Gus were the only ones there, so they took off with it, got over to the fire and the hose off and by that time about four more men had arrived. While the house burned down, they were able to keep the fire from spreading.

Buster Keaton Movie
About the time Buster Keaton was here in Cottage Grove making the picture "The General" they got their first fire truck, which was a Studebaker and had more hose. During this time, the building next to where Gus had his store caught on fire and through

the efforts of the people in the picture company, they were able to save both buildings.

In commenting on the old Cottage Grove baseball team of about 55 years ago, he says it was really a team. George and Bill McQueen were the pitchers, Warren McFarland was the catcher and one of the best catchers he has ever seen and he never saw anyone steal second base on him. Elzie Holderman was short stop.

When automobiles were starting to come into use in this area, any time one would go down the road, everyone would run to shut their door as the dust would roll as the said roads were just trails with dust during the dry weather up to a foot deep.

Bohemia Trip

Gus also tells of an interesting story of a trip up to Bohemia with George Bowman, a tailor, who had some mines in the Bohemia District. He made a deal with Gus that if he would go up with him and help him with some work, he would tailor him a suit of clothes, so they were to start out about 4 in the morning of this particular day. Shortly after 4 a.m. he came along with a team of ponies and a light wagon.

Bowman was a good fellow, but liked to drink, and was pretty well loaded even at that time in the morning. Gus felt that the wagon was not strong enough to make the trip, but they started out and got about 12 miles up Row River when they got off on the wrong road and while they managed to get back on the road okay, but he turned the horses right square around and turned the wagon over. Whiskey bottles and dynamite, along with everything else they were taking for the trip, rolled out of the wagon. They unhitched the horses, packed everything back in the wagon and stayed all night in a barn.

The next morning they packed the horses and got up as far as Mineral Springs and then the following day made it the rest of the way up. They stayed with Johnny and Godfrey Graber who were working the Vesuvius mine. On
