EUGENE, (Special) — Circuit Judge Alfred D. Goodwin, recently appointed by Governor Paul Patterson to fill the vacancy created by the elevation of William G. East to the federal court, was sworn in by Chief Justice Harold J. Warner of the Oregon Supreme Court in ceremonies in Eugene Friday.

Judge Goodwin, 32, will be one of the youngest circuit judges in Oregon, and will be one of five circuit judges serving the Second Judicial District which includes Douglas, Coos and Curry Counties as well as Lane County where it is expected that he will be principally assigned.

Judge William S. Fort, prominent Eugene - Springfield attorney, was also sworn in at the same time to fill a vacancy on the court created by the recent session of the Legislature. Both new judges expect to be candidates for election to their offices in the May primary elections.
