

Cascade Bowmen Take Men's Team Champ. As Grovers Host Oregon Shoot Over Weekend

Archers of all ages from every section of the Willamette valley, including Portland, walked off with championships in the annual Oregon State Archery Association tournament staged at Dorena Dam recreation area during a three-day event that closed Monday.

A flock of state records were established and the team championship for men went to the Cascadian Bowmen of Eugene and the women's title to the Sylvan Archers of Portland.

More than 100 archers registered for the tournament, which next year will likely be staged at the Sherwood Forest area in Portland. State officials elected include George Calvert of Portland, president; Paul Unger of Portland, vice president; and Marge Hamilton of Portland, secretary-treasurer.

Among the many records, the Cascadian Bowmen, a team composed of Ike Epperly, Dick Coghill, Dale Fuller and Dick Hamilton, scored a record-breaking 2,567 as against the 2,489 set by Portland Archers in 1954.

Dorothy Whitmore of Portland bettered her own record of 1,601 with a 1,667 to win the women's grand championship. She also set new records in the American and Columbian rounds.

Bill Snyder of Portland set a record 1,653 to win the junior boys grand championship, beating the 1,411 set by Bill Chism of Portland in 1954. He also set records in the National, American rounds and clout shoot.

Barbara Glasser of Portland set records in the National, Columbia and Clout for junior girls.
