Pacific Tel. & Tel. To Install Radio Relay Bldg. Soon

Construction will begin soon on a radio relay building on Harness Mountain, it was announced today by local Pacific Telephone Manager C. W. Hawkins.

The one-story concrete and block building will be one of a series of eight which will provide microwave channels for three network television programs between Portland and the San Francisco bay area. A standby channel for emergency use will also be provided.

The underground coaxial cable now "piping" TV programs into the Pacific Northwest will be used to augment existing long distance telephone facilities when the microwave system goes into operation. One channel in the cable will be kept available, however, for transmitting television from north to south when required.

The other buildings are to be erected on property owned or leased by the telephone company near Silverton, Albany, Eugene, Roseburg, Wolf Creek, Medford, and Siskiyou Summit.

Highway Commission Receives Bid on Paving Project Near Cottage Grove

SALEM—(Special)—The Oregon State Highway Commission, meeting in Portland last week, acted on 34 separate projects, totaling \$3,100,283 in bids accepted. A single bid on one project was rejected as being too high during the two-day meet.

Largest single project acted upon was for 4.69 miles of grading and paving on the Reedville-Beaverton Section of the Tualatin Valley Highway. Low bidder on the project was Porter W. Yett, \$596,233 referred to the State Highway Engineer for final approval and award after necessary right-of-way is obtained.

Parker - Schram Co., Portland,

was low bidder on the second largest project which received attention. The company's bid of \$489,533 for the paving of 6.46 miles on the Cottage Grove-Divide Unit, Goshen - Divide Section of the Pacific Highway in Lane County near Cottage Grove was referred to the State Highway Engineer for final approval after necessary right-of-way is obtained.

Smallest project was awarded to Trussfab, Inc., Portland, on a bid of \$10,476 for the placing of guardrail on the North Santiam and Santiam Highways about 21 miles southeast of Detroit and 18 miles east of Cascadia at the Santiam Junction.

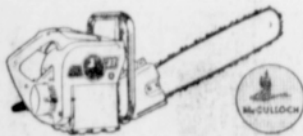
