Shrine All-Star Grid Tilt Nears

PORTLAND (Special) — The 8th annual Shrine's hospital all-star football game — "Football's finest hour" — is still more than a month away, but rival coaches have already begun laying plans for the grid classic, pitting outstanding Portland area high school seniors from last year against the ranking seniors from high schools throughout the state.

Coaches Tom DeSylvia of the Metropolitan squad and Lee Gustafson of the State aggregation have written their respective players, asking them to report in shape here for the opening of two weeks of practice on August 8. The game will be played August 20 in Multnomah stadium.

DeSylvia, head coach of Portland's Jefferson high, has advised his proteges that by reporting in good physical condition, they will have a better chance of earning a starting berth on the Metro eleven.

DeSylvia and Gustafson, who piloted South Salem to a tie for the state title last year, stated in their letters to the players that they plan to begin rough work right away.

"We will have only two weeks to get ready and it will help considerably if we can get right down to work," Gustafson said, explaining that "we can't spend too much time on conditioning."

DeSylvia is determined to put an end to the Metro losing streak, which now totals four in a row to the State aggregation. He admits that Gustafson has an exceptionally strong State squad, but firmly believes that the Metros will be considerably stronger than at any time in recent years.

Rotary Screening Proves of Value

At seven rotary screen installation checking stations on five Oregon streams more than 22,400 trout, steelhead and salmon were tallied through the by-pass trap and prevented from entering irrigation and power diversion canals this past month, according to word from the Oregon Game Commission.

At one rotary screen trap on the Umatilla river, 3,554 trout and steelhead were prevented from entering the irrigation canal and becoming lost to the angler. Three stations on the Wallowa and Lostine rivers by-passed 2,448 trout and salmon, and at two screens on Catherine creek, 1,475 trout and salmon were also shunted back to the main river system.

The big saving for the month took place at the Marmot dam power diversion on the Sandy river where more than 15,000 downstream migrants were saved by the fish screens. These downstream migrants consisted of 193 cut-throat, 3,894 marked hatchery reared steelhead, 7,422 wild steelhead, and 3,584 silver salmon.

All of the above recordings were made by game commission personnel during May 16 through June 15.

At the present, the Oregon Game Commission has in operation on irrigation and power diversion canals more than 1,000 rotary screens which prevent fish life from entering and becoming lost to the angler. At 20 of these screen installations, checking stations are maintained by the commission where records are kept of both upstream and downstream migrant fish. Last year these 20 stations recorded a total of 89,235 trout, steelhead, and salmon which were prevented from entering irrigation and power diversions.

Disabled Veterans Licenses Changed

In a move designed to eliminate abuse of the disabled veterans hunting and fishing license law and to protect bona fide disabled veterans, the recent legislature amended the law providing stiffer requirements for license applicants.

As amended, the law now requires all applicants to furnish written proof from the U. S. Veterans Bureau of their disability status each time application is made for a disabled veterans hunting and/or fishing license. The amendment becomes effective August 2, 1955.

Eligible veterans are those who have served on active duty in the military or naval service of the United States, who have been residents of the State of Oregon for more than one year preceding application for a hunting or fishing license, and who are rated by the U.S. Veterans Bureau as being at least 25 per cent disabled. Disabled veterans hunting

and fishing licenses are issued by the game commission for a fee of fifty cents.

Another new provision provides that U.S. Veterans of wars prior to World War I may obtain the special license without certification of disability.

To correct a misunderstanding which has prevailed in the past, disabled veterans licenses are issued only at the game commission's Portland office located at 1634 S.W. Alder. All applications must be notarized before a license can be issued.

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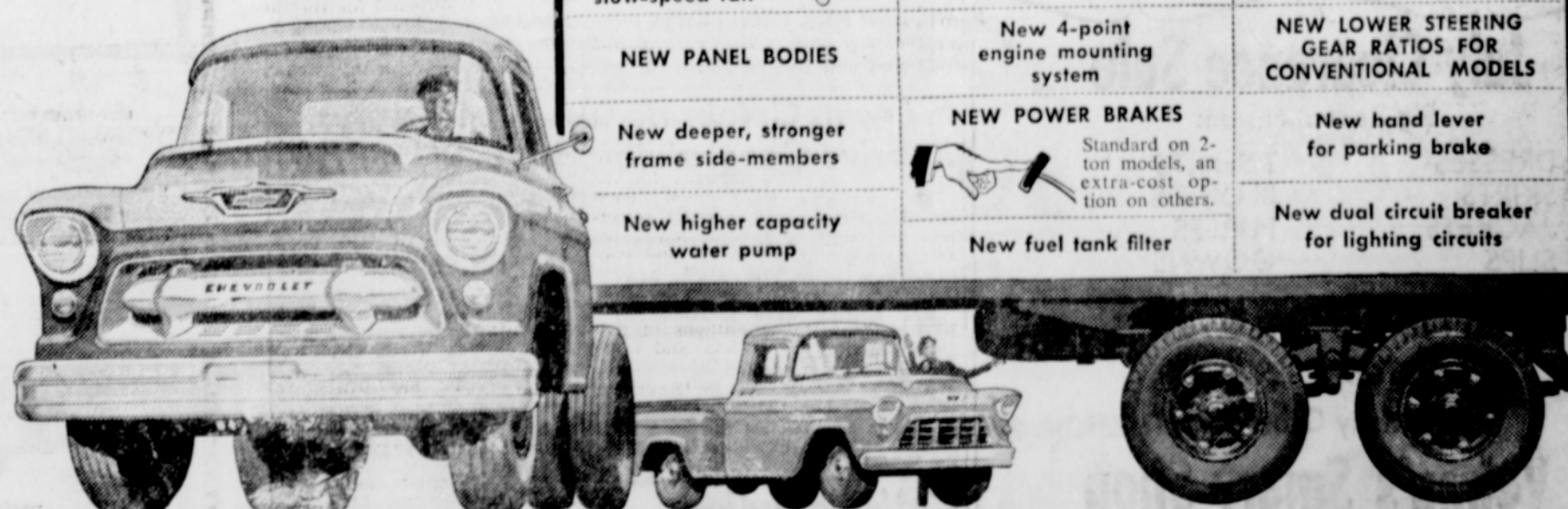
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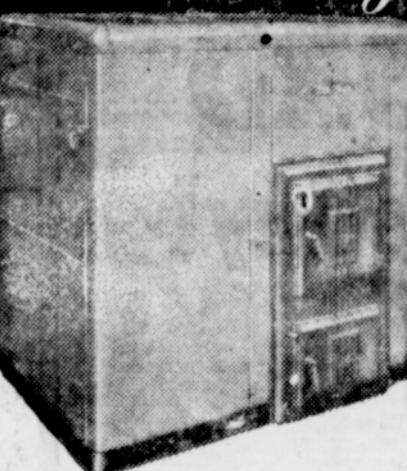


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
