Chances Brighten For Fishermen

Anglers now have more than 1,200,000 additional chances toward making limit catches, thanks to the work being done by liberation crews, Oregon State Game Commission.

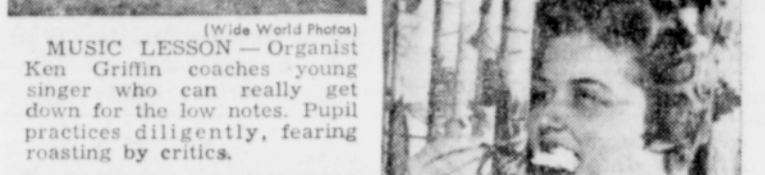
According to Reino Koski, chief of fish liberations, this is the number of trout and steelhead of legal size which had been planted so far this spring in the streams, lakes, and reservoirs of the state. An additional 538,000 fry and fingerlings have also been planted with most of these fish released into lakes and reservoirs.

Liberation crews will continue operations in most of the major streams throughout the summer, moving into the high Cascade areas as soon as weather permits. During the month of June, streams west of the Cascades will receive their heaviest plantings. Legal cutthroat and steelhead are now being released in most of the coastal streams.

Plans now call for more than 11 million trout, steelhead, and salmon, of which 3 million are of catchable size, to be liberated from game commission hatcheries during the planting season.

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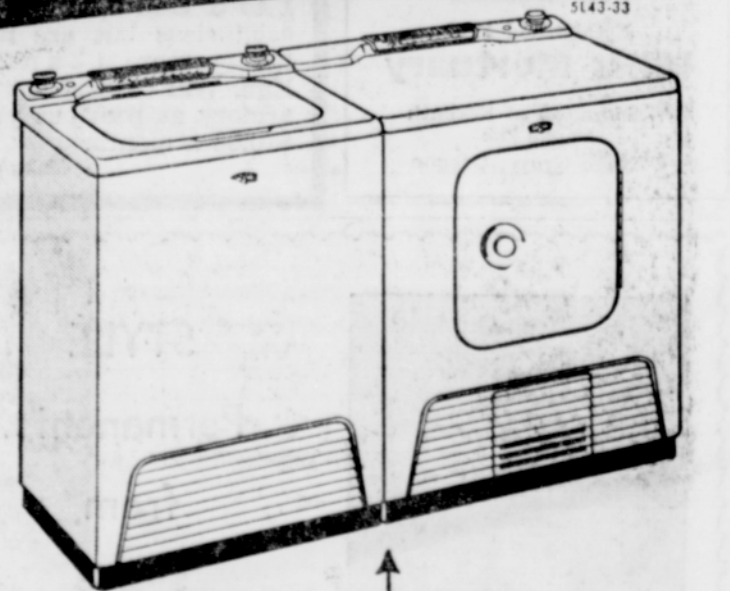
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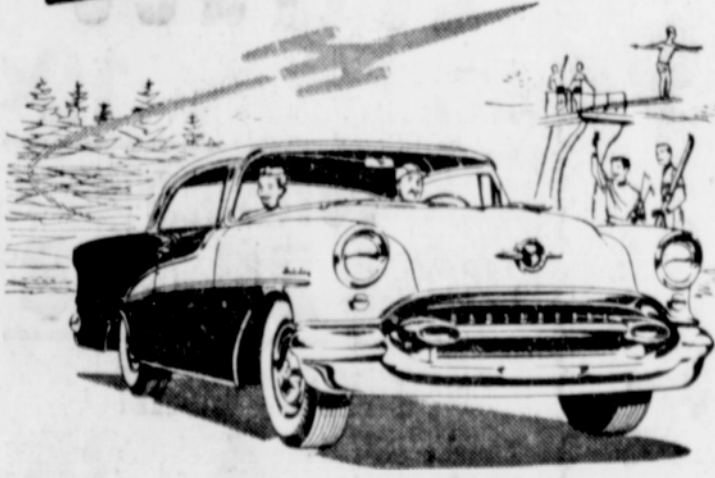
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
