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Officer Candidate Program Told By Marine Corps

EUGENE—An entirely new officer candidate program has been inaugurated for college graduates who desire to fly with the U.S. Marines.

Instead of applying with the Naval Aviation Cadets, applications now are being accepted from college seniors and recent graduates for the Marine Aviation Officer Candidates course leading toward a commission and becoming a pilot.

Applicants must be motivated and adapted for flying, not more than 27 years of age, of high moral character, a graduate of an accredited college and meet the physical requirements for aviation.

After flight training in Quantico, Va., assignment will be to jets, transports, helicopters or conventional aircraft with Marine Corps squadrons ashore or with the nation's fleet.

Also, a man upon enlistment in the regular Marine Corps can apply for airman's school to serve with the Marine air wing right along with the pilots.

Marines Report Enlistment Data

The U. S. Marine Corps Recruiting office, post office building, Eugene, announces that enlistments are now being accepted for periods of three and four years, at the man's option.

Enlistments for women Marines remain the same, three years, with a minimum age of 18, a high school graduate and of high physical and moral quality. Young women between the ages of 17 and 18 need parental consent.

Physical qualifications for male volunteers is 17 years of age and average height.

The Eugene office also states that the Marine Corps encourages men to enlist under the "buddy system," a system whereby two or more men will be together through their recruit and advanced training in Southern California.
