Portland Airmen Plan Distance Record This Year

The 403rd Troop Carrier Wing located at Portland International Airport will set a national long distance record this year among the 33 reserve units participating in active duty encampments. The men and equipment of the 403rd are being airlifted from Portland to Ardmore, Okla. A distance of 1500 miles by 15 of their own C-46 type aircraft and 5 giant C-124 Globemasters of the 62nd Troop Carrier Wing at Larson Air Force base, Wash.

This 1500 mile move by the 403rd is over twice the distance that any of the nation's other reserve wings will travel for summer encampment. The next farthest being a 700 mile move by the 88th Air Depot.

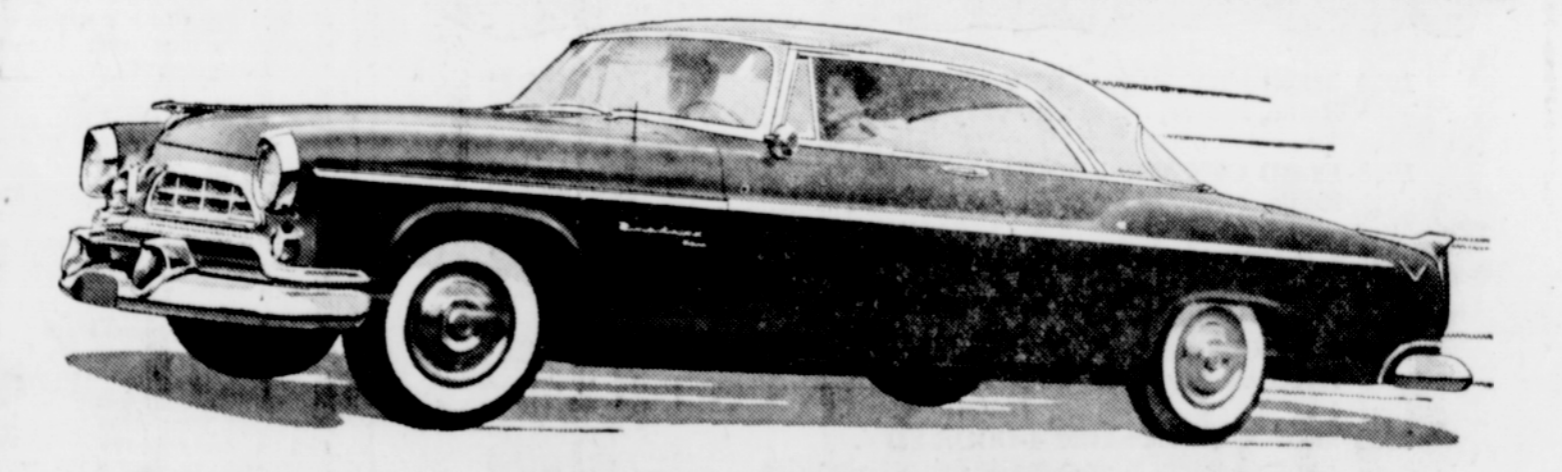
