## Sport License Changes To Be in Effect Jan. 1

None of the fishing and hunting license fee changes adopted by the legislature will be in effect this year according to the Oregon State Game Commission.

The \$10.00 daily salmon angling license, the reduction in the non-resident angling license fee, and the \$10.00 reciprocal nonresident waterfowl license for residents of adjoining states will all take effect on January 1, 1956.

The daily salmon angling license may be used by residents or nonresidents in place of a regular license when angling for chinook or silver salmon. Persons using this license must purchase a new one for each day of fishing.

The \$10.00 nonresident angling license fee will bring Oregon into line with California, Idaho and Washington.

The nonresident waterfowl license may be used by a resident of an adjoining state only if his own state has a similar license and fee for Oregon residents.

## Grovers Clobber Roseburg 9-4 Sun.

## New Law to Determine Game Meat Ownership

A new statute adapted by the legislature will be an aid to enforcement officers in determining the legality of possession of big game meat. According to the Oregon State Game Commission, the new act provides that when a big game carcass is divided between two or more persons, the untaxed portions must be accompanied by a written record of the tag number and the name and address of the person retaining the portion to which the tag is attached. The law becomes effective August 3, 1955.

The written record must stay with the untaxed portion as long as preserved or until a metal seal or tag of the game commission is attached.

The act specifies that the written record need only accompany the primal portions of a carcass which the act defines as being a shoulder, rib, loin, rump, or hind-quarter.

The new law will also be an assist to hunters who would otherwise be required to locate a game officer or agent of the game commission to get the portion tagged.

Remember hunters, when you transport the untaxed portion of a big game animal this fall, be sure you have a written record of the name, address and big game tag number of the person whose tag is attached to the carcass.

## Outboard Racers To Compete Soon At Devil's Lake

Devil's Lake, claimed to be one of the fastest courses in the world, will be the scene August 27, 28 and 29 of the 1955 National Stock Outboard Championship races.

Some new records are expected to be established in this "World Series" of outboard racing as approximately 400 of the nation's fastest stock outboard boats and drivers compete for the year's top awards.

Devil's Lake, located in Oregon's North Lincoln county, is no stranger to most outboard racers. Six of the ten stock outboard class world records have been set on this Oregon lake, as have six of the nine racing class records, and two of the mile straightaway marks.

Reasons for Devil's Lake reputation as an exceptionally fast body of water for outboard racing are threefold. Only a few feet above sea level, the dense air aids combustion in the outboards, as does damp ocean air which churns in from the Pacific ocean a few yards to the west. And during the warm summer months, an algae growth often takes place in the lake. Racing experts say this thickens the water, gives the whirling propellers a better bite, producing more speed. As George Calkins of DeLakes, race chairman and boat builder, explains, "hit a patch of algae doing 30 and your boat jumps to 35 miles per hour as the prop gets better traction."

Sponsoring this "World Series" of the outboard races is the Devil's Lake Racing Club, Inc. North Lincolnites were approached by national headquarters to determine if they would be interested in holding the races at Devil's Lake. They were and the sponsoring group was formed.

Some thousand drivers and mechanics are expected to be on hand, with 5 to 50 horsepower outboards taking part. Berths in the national races go to the top drivers in the 16 regions of the United States.

This is only the second time the nationals have been held in the west.

## All-star Grid Opponents Equal In Weight Dept.

PORTLAND, July — Opposing teams in the eighth annual Shriner's hospital all - star football game August 20 in Multnomah stadium are a stand-off in the weight department, according to Eugene W. Ferguson, Portland's deputy police chief and the game's managing director.

The 24-man Metropolitan squad will average 185 3/4 pounds as against 185 1/3 pounds for the State. Ferguson revealed, adding that as far as he knows, this is the closest in weight the two teams have been since the colorful gridiron classic was inaugurated.

In the height department, the Metros will have a considerable edge. Twelve of the Metros tower over the 6-foot mark, including three at 6-feet 3-inches. State will have only five players over 6 feet and only one measuring 6 feet 3 inches.

Huskiest man on the roster of either team is Jack Stone, a tackle from Gresham high, who will be performing for the Metros. He stands 6 feet 2 inches and tips the scales at 240 pounds. State, however, lists four players over the 200-pound mark as against three for the Metros.

The biggest pair of shoes—size 13—will be worn by a Metro player. Closest State can come is a size 12.

Ferguson paused from his recital of vital statistics to report that mail orders for reserved seats at \$3 each are running ahead of the same time a year ago and urged persons to get their orders in early. Mail orders should be sent to Shriners' Hospital All - Star Football Headquarters, Masonic temple, 1119 S.W. Park Avenue, Portland.

The game, often called "Football's Finest Hour," pits outstanding high school seniors from Portland area counties against stand-out seniors from other counties throughout the state. Metro players are selected from Multnomah, Washington, Clackamas and Columbia counties.

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
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
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
