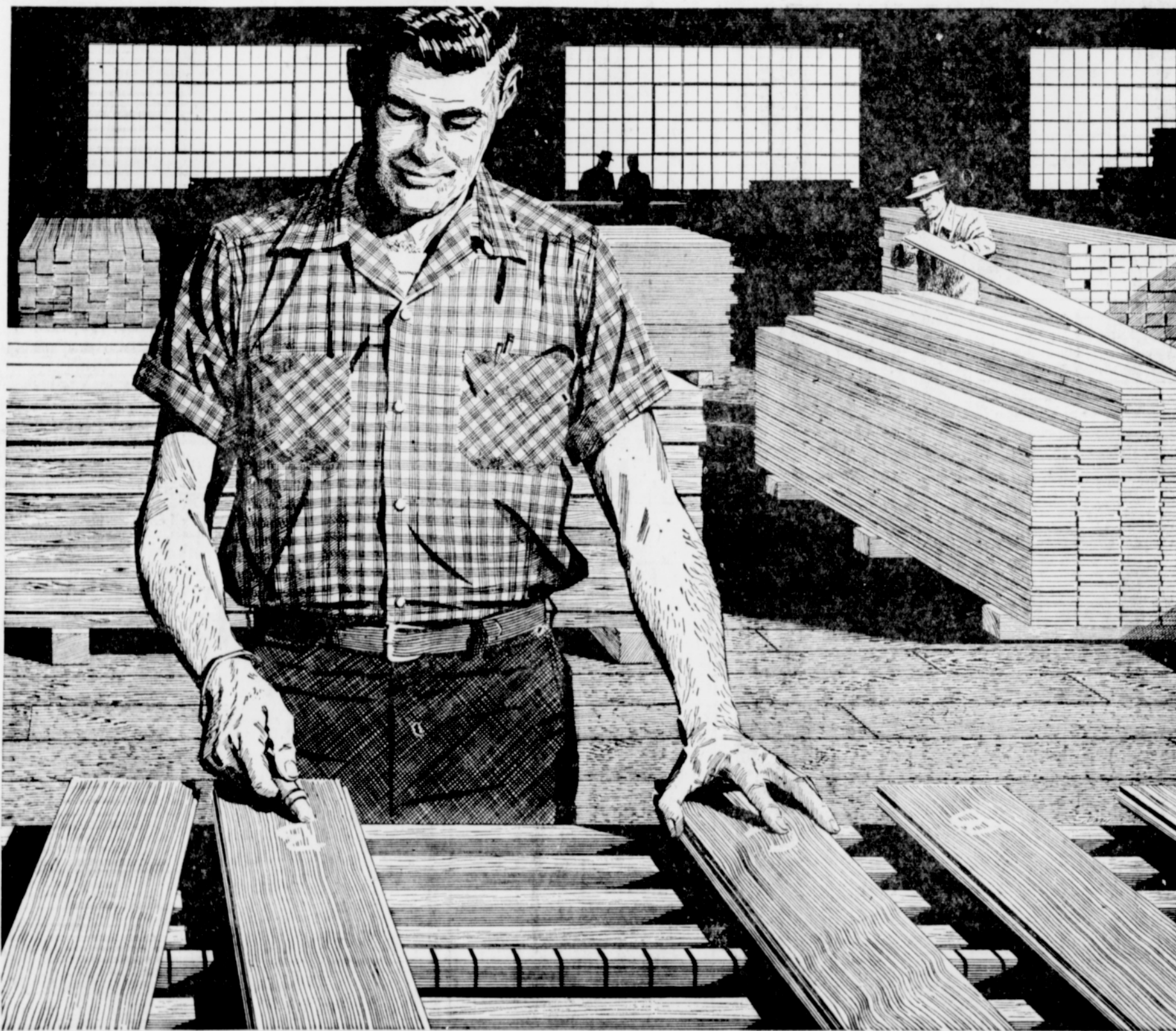

To achieve continuing quality, members of the industry adhere to uniform grading standards against which each piece of lumber and plywood is evaluated before shipment to the customer. Trained men at the various mills grade-mark the materials, and the accuracy of their work is periodically checked by quality-control supervisors employed by industry associations.

Quality control by the forest products industry is a voluntary activity...one of several designed to make the industry a permanent source of employment and income for Pacific Northwest communities.

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
