Movie About Prevention Of Accidents Available

"Mrs. Hazard's House," a film on child accident prevention is available to parent-teacher associations, service clubs, church groups and other community or-

ganizations for showings at their meetings during the coming year, according to Miss Janice Westaby, home safety consultant for the state board of health.

Miss Westaby said the department has obtained several prints of the 16 mm. sound film on permanent loan from the Prudential Insurance Company of America, but that demand for the film makes it advisable for groups to book it as far in advance as possible.

The safety film is made available free by the health department, along with literature, posters and speakers, if requested, as a part of its year-round "child safety crusade," aimed at reducing the tremendous toll of children who are killed and crippled by accidents in the home area.
