Sentinel Editor Tours London; Tells of Farms, Castles, Food

(The Sentinel's editor and publisher, W. C. Martin, and his wife left around a month ago for their European trip. They recently visited for about a week in England, and the editor writes the following letter about London.)

If you are a successful traveler, you must also be a good athlete, because of the public transportation system. One has to walk a good deal of walking in London. The world's biggest city, is in the midst of its best tourist season. Unless the tourist has advanced reservation, one is lucky most of the time to get a place to sleep.

There are several things the U. S. tourist has to get used to here. One the hotel room without a bath, the bathroom is usually located in another part of the building. The price of your hotel room includes breakfast. And breakfast is quite a meal, the only one most of us enjoy. There is a menu to select from and includes: Two kinds of fish, grilled bacon and eggs, toast and orange marmalade. It never changes. The same items are offered day in and day out.

Why the Romans Left
If one remembers the English history, you will recall that the Romans were here shortly after A.D. and remained for a number of years, but nobody seems to know just when or why they left. A guide on a recent tour suggests the Romans may have grown tired of bacon and eggs every morning.

England is steeped in history and tradition and they seem to like it. While the Indians were roaming the American country, the English were making history and to prove it, one can see the London towers, one time strong holds of the early rulers. Numbers of political prisoners were beheaded here including the wife of a king, Anne Boland. Early London was defended by the towers, only a short distance from the Thames river (pronounced Tims). Prisoners were rowed up to the Towers from the Thames and were either beheaded or executed. Walls of the Towers in places are 14 feet thick and hence almost impregnable.

One of the most interesting places in the Towers is the room containing the Crown Jewels. Here one can see some of the biggest diamonds in the world as well as an assortment of crowns made for the various rulers.

Small Farms
One of the most interesting tours was a 90 mile ride in the rural district northwest of London to see the Warwick castle and Stratford on Avon, the birth place of Shakespeare.

The visitor can see the farms and how the farmers live. Farms here seem to range in size from one to 15 acres, each patch being separated by a tree hedge. There are longer patches, but these are an exception. The English are a beautiful and green at this season of the year, although there were complaints made that the weather was too dry.

One thing about the English farmers—they do not occupy the same financial position of the American farmers. They have no refrigeration and no sanitary regulation as to the production of milk. Those who like a glass of cold milk to drink are disappointed as I was. Milk is kept at room temperature and often tastes like taking some sort of medicine or like on the American farm some 30 or 40 years ago. Milk is not pasteurized and the consumer does not know if the cows have been tested. You turn to some sort of drink other than milk and soon get the tea habit.

English History
On the visit to Warwick castle, you learn more English history and that the castle was once occupied by kings. The buildings, erected in circular shape, were first built in 1300. Part of the castle later burned and was rebuilt in 1700. The Earl of Warwick still occupies the castle, but the tourist or visitor is permitted to see seven or eight rooms, still in use in certain functions. Of course one can see many relics as well as beautiful pictures, tables with inlaid wood and the large bed of Queen Anne, with the curtains around the bed, which could be drawn to keep out the night air. Queen Anne bore 17 children and lost them all before they reached the age of 15. Maybe try to keep out the night air was the chief cause.

The tourist pays two and a half shillings for admission of two. The English who are finding that the maintenance of castles is becoming increasingly expensive, have turned to the tourist for help. Soon all historic places will be available to the public. Recently Windsor castle, about 20 miles from here, was opened to the tourists.

Bomb damage is still visible. At St. Paul's church, the largest church outside of Rome, workmen have been making repairs now for eight years and have two more years to go before the job is completed. Building of homes and apartments were given priority over commercial building, shortly after the war because of the terrific demand. Row after row of new houses, all brick, have been erected here and more are in the process of construction. Like the English menu, the style of the houses seldom varies.

To be a good tourist, one must be a good walker, be prepared to stand in line if necessary and do a little shoving. Touring here is not really a vacation, its work.

Change of Guard
One of the high spots of a visit here is watching the changing of the guard at Buckingham palace, where the Royal family lives. The ceremony takes place once a week and probably has not changed for several hundred years. The real ceremony takes place once a week on Mondays. The guard on duty lines up behind the palace gates, dressed in a colorful uniform with

the traditional red coats and high black caps. After a series of military maneuvers, the new guard marches in to hand music and one by one the guard is changed. The guard force numbers about 30. After the foot guard is changed, out comes the horse guards, dressed in white caps and colorful uniforms riding black horses. This guard rides down the palace road until the new guard is met.

The ceremony was watched by about 4,000 tourists. It must be rather monotonous for members of the royal family to see the "rubber necks" fondling cazing at the palace every time they look toward the street. There certainly is no privacy from the street which the palace faces.

Weather Improves
The weather has turned good as we are about to leave London. We arrived here in a heat wave, which was followed by severe storms with rains measuring up to seven inches in one place. Three or four deaths resulted from being struck by lightning, rather unusual for this section of the country, natives tell us.

The tourist business should further stabilize England's economy. We came over on the ship, Seven Seas, which carried 1,068 passengers. Of this number, over 800 boarded the special train for London. In addition to the regular crop of tourists, there are over 800 delegates attending the jubilee meeting of the Baptist

World's Alliance from 60 nations. One unusual aspect of this meeting is the faultless English spoken by some of the foreign ministers. Perhaps the delegation attracting the most attention was the one from Russia. The leader of this delegation addressed the gathering thru the use of an interpreter and was given much applause when he concluded his remarks.

Eugene Couple in London
We have met Mr. and Mrs. Elmo Chase of Eugene, who are concluding a tour of a dozen mission fields of the American Baptist convention. Meetings are being held in Albert Hall, a building which will seat about 7,500 people. Fortunately, not all the delegates try to attend at once. Getting home after attending a session of the Alliance is quite a problem, when you have to depend on bus transportation or else walk to the subway about a half mile away. Some have waited over an hour and a half.

July 21 we leave by plane for Frankfurt, Germany, where we will be met by our son, Walter Jr., of Stuttgart. The opera season there will close on July 24. He tells us that the season for the Amerika House, an organization of American singers sponsored by the state department, appeared in a final concert at Stuttgart recently and were given a 20 minute ovation at the finish of the program.

In conclusion, we might mention that if you are looking for work, you should have no trouble in finding it here. Dailies here carry about two pages of help wanted ads, in small type (6 point).
