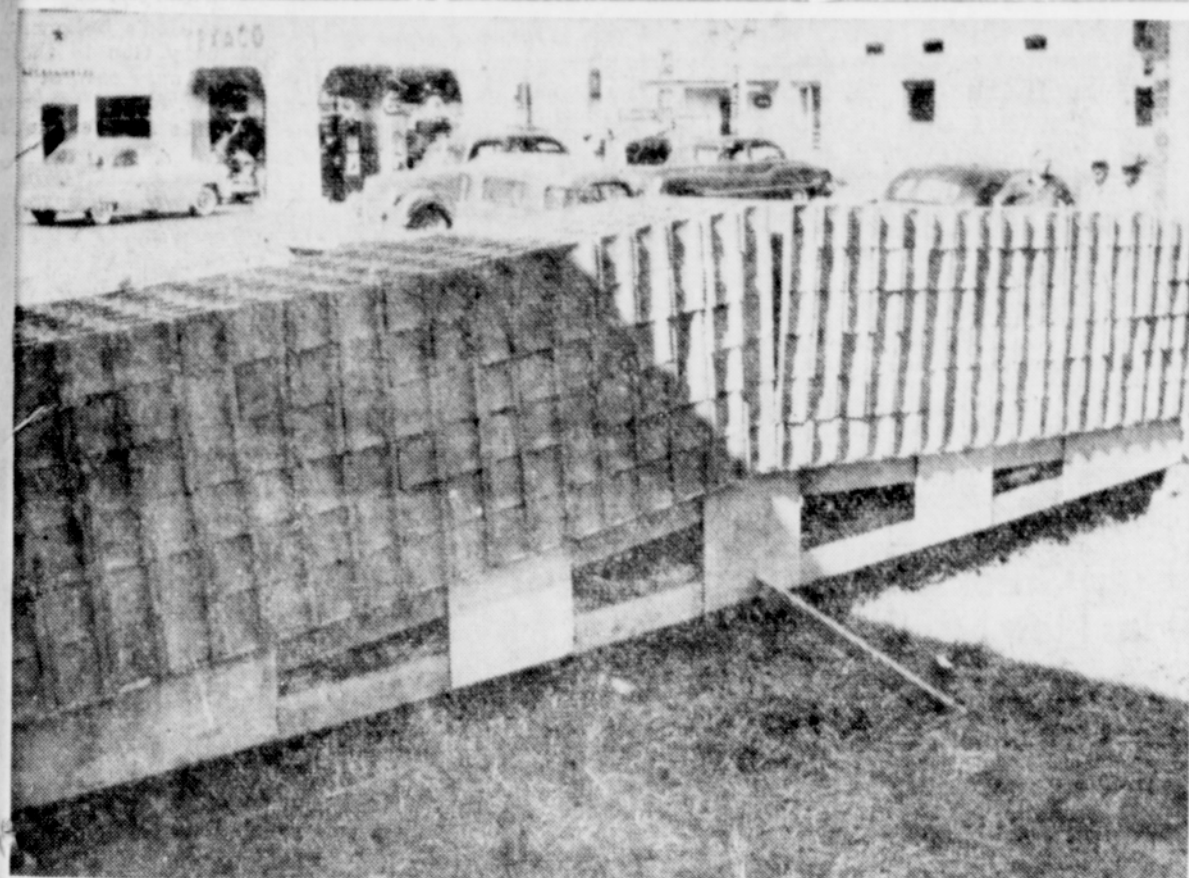

ABOVE IS SHOWN A FINE EXAMPLE OF THE EVOLUTION OF TRUSS BUILDING, a project undertaken by Sears Building Supply and Cottage Grove Construction Co. to answer some of their own questions on the matter. During the test, conducted Saturday in the lot between Pioneer Hardware and the army surplus store, 2½ tons of concrete building blocks were piled on the truss, or an equivalent of 21 feet of wet snow. The construction held 2½ tons more than was anticipated and it was estimated that another two tons could be added without its breaking. The truss has a rise of one foot and is 24 feet in length.

Jets will Buzz Mary's Peak Trek

CORVALLIS—Soaring jets from the Portland air force base will fly over the Mary's Peak Trek, Sunday, August 7, it was announced here by Cecil Blakely, Trek manager.

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though. The commanding officer will have a station on the peak so he can talk to the flyers.

Conversation between the commanding officer and the jet flyers will be broadcast to the crowd. Trekkers will be able to hear the command and see how smoothly it is executed by the jets.

Rev. Mathew Simpson of Portland will give the invocation at the Trek at 11:45 a.m. before activities begin. Johnny Carpenter, Portland radio announcer, will be master of ceremonies.

One of the entertainment numbers will be Red Dunning and his band with the vocal by MC Carpenter. Other acts will fill in two hours.

Irving, Krick, Denver, Colo., weather predictor, said August 7 would be "most desirable for the 1955 Shrine Trek." It will be partly cloudy skies with temperature in the low 80's in the afternoon.

Shrine musical groups participating will be Oriental band, Al Kader drum corps and Al Kader band. A merry-go-round and kiddie car ride will be installed at the Trek for the "restless tots," Blakely said.

Donations to the Trek may be made on Trek day. The show is free. All profits go to the Shrine Hospital for Crippled Children in Portland. Contributions to the hospital from the Trek have amounted to \$125,000 the past nine years. Prizes awarded at the Trek will include a 1955 Plymouth sedan, Bendix automatic dryer, Wyler wrist watch, Hornell casting rod, Mitchell spinning reel, a 35 mm. camera, three-way floor lamp, barometer and diamond ring.

Public Aid Asked In Searching for Holly Tree Pest

Do you have a holly tree or trees in your back yard? If so, the state department of agriculture urges you to take a "good look at last year's leaves" (it won't be on the new leaves) for irregular blotches which sometimes resemble blisters. They may be small or large. Any suspicious leaves should be sent to the department at Salem, or to your county agent. These leaves may show damage from holly leaf miner, first found in this state in southern Portland on May 25.

Holly leaves sent to the department by a private citizen the past week disclosed presence of this leaf miner in the Parkrose district northeast of Portland. In the southeast section of metropolitan Portland, the pest has been traced to the center of the town of Milwaukie, east of there about three miles and west to the Riverwood and Riverdale districts. The survey entomologists believe (as of June 17) the Terwilliger Boulevard extension marks the western limit of the pest.

Though the pest is easy to control, department officials urge all holly growers to watch for it. Many homes have ornamental plantings which will be disfigured for decorative uses if the leaf miner should be present but is not recognized and controlled. The pest is of economic importance to Oregon's commercial holly industry, now grown on about 1500 acres and worth annually as high as a million dollars.

Up to now, the leaf miner has not been found in commercial plantings in Oregon; if it should be commercial operators, like home owners, will have the advantage of control measures already established in other states where the leaf miner has been found. The important thing right now is for owners of holly trees to help the state determine the limit of spread of this pest.

Inheritance, Gift Taxes Top Guess Of Last Biennium

Revenues received from state inheritance and gift taxes during the last biennium totaled \$6,076,142.75, amounting to \$1,576,142.75 in excess of the estimated legislative budget of \$4,500,000, according to State Treasurer Sig. Unander.

The million and half dollar increase in collections by the state treasurer's office is attributed by Unander to improved administrative practices installed by Treasurer Unander shortly after he took over the office of State Treasurer.

At the suggestion of Treasurer Unander, the 1955 legislature authorized the employment of 15 field men for the inheritance and gift tax division of the treasurer's office.

Through the work of this staff, plus the continued efficient operation of the inheritance tax department, the goal for the present biennium without any increase in tax rates is \$6,750,000.

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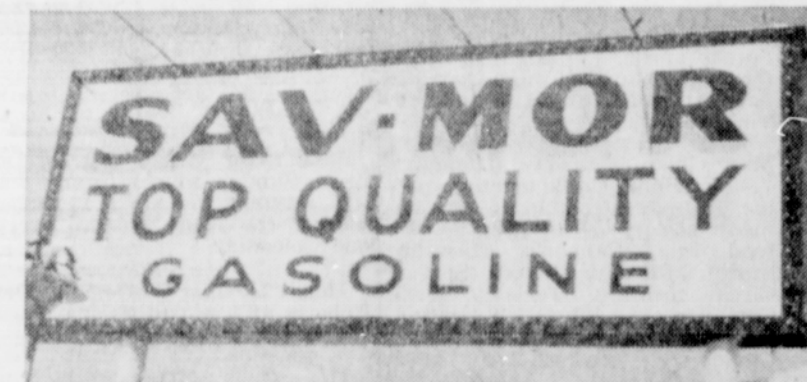
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
