Thornton Corners Folk Visit Children In Grants Pass

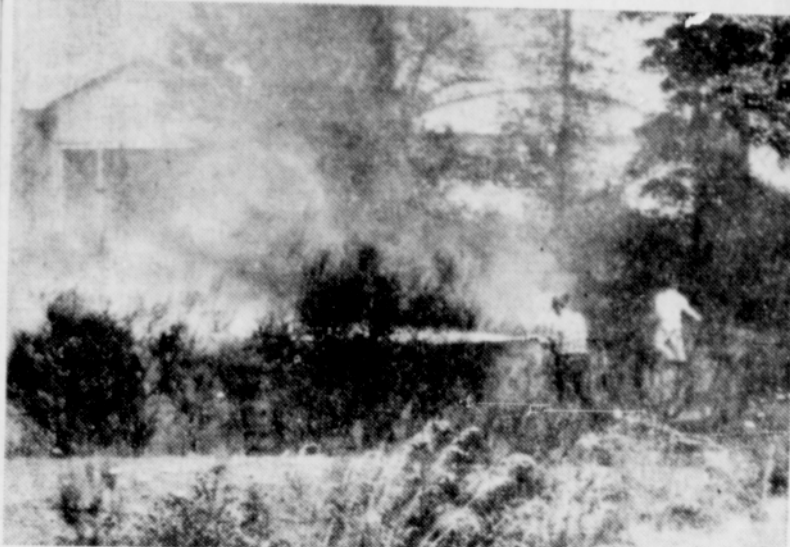
