Many Awards to Be Presented At Western Oregon Exposition

Plans for the Western Oregon Exposition August 26, 27 and 28, are progressing well, according to Mrs. L. E. Morton, publicity chairman, with several new awards featured in the 1955 fair.

A new award which does not appear in the premium book has just been announced for the Foods Division. Mrs. Charles Laughton, home economics judge, will give one of her Mary Cullen Cookbooks to one of the best exhibit of a plate of six of the best cook-ies and one for the best exhibit of sweet rolls. The rolls can be of any variety, such as Danish pastry, cinnamon roll, or such. This is indeed a prize worth making an effort to show the committee, as Mrs. Laughton's Mary Cullen Cookbook is about the finest one can have in the kitchen.

Another special in the foods division is being given by the Lake Spray Service in the breads class. Awards of \$2.50 cash will be given for the best loaves of white and brown bread.

A feature of Saturday evening at the fair will be the Fat Stock Auction for 4-H and FFA animals.

Showmanship Contest

One of the most interesting events for livestock fans is the Showmanship Contest where 4-H and FFA members show their stock. These are judged on their own personal appearance and attitude, the ability to show the animal to good advantage and move it as directed by the judge and the animal's condition and grooming. The purpose of this contest is to teach boys and girls courtesy, good grooming, poise and confidence and how to fit, train and handle animals.

Exhibitors of livestock must have had their animals meet the health requirements as listed in the premium book. Dr. Charles Rosecrans is fair veterinarian. Livestock entries must be made at the Chamber of Commerce by August 22 by application blank, so that pens and shelter will be prepared for animals to be shown. A copy of the application is in the premium book.

Minimum of Stock

The fair board is going ahead with plans to increase the livestock program at their fair in 1956, when suitable grounds can be prepared. This can be done only through cooperation of the people of the community in backing the fair this year and making it a financial success, so that the establishment of a permanent fair site may be made by next year. The Ways and Means committee has been working diligently on methods for raising funds at the fair this year so that financial conditions can enable starting work immediately following this year's fair.

A complete program activities of the fair will be given in the Sentinel next week.

Lane UA Goal Set Under \$300,000

The Steering Committee of the United Appeal has set the campaign goal for \$299,789.00 for the campaign this fall.

This represents the combined budgets of the 30 agencies of the Community Chest and the American Red Cross. This does not represent the total need of either, because the Budget Committee has previously reduced the requested amount more than \$40,000.00.

The goal this year is 10% higher than last year, for several reasons: The additions of the Eugene Speech and Hearing Center and the Youth Recreation Program for Florence, and also the increased use of the programs of the agencies, according to Julio W. Silva, Chairman of the Steering Committee.

Dan Allen, General Campaign Chairman, stated that this goal does not equal the contributions of last year when the Red Cross in March of 1954, raised \$81,000.00. The Red Cross did not put on a campaign in March of 1955. He requests that all contributors include both the Community Chest and the American Red Cross in their gifts this year.

No word has been received as to Cottage Grove's share in the drive.

Flames Destroy John Rockwell Home Wed. P.M.

A late Wednesday evening fire destroyed the home of Mr. and Mrs. John Rockwell of Culp Creek. The fire, which broke out about 11:30 that evening, did an estimated \$9,500 worth of damage. Their home is located in back of Strand's Grocery.

Mr. Rockwell was working in Florence at the time of the fire and had to be called home. Mrs. Rockwell and son, 13, were sleeping when the fire broke out and escaped through an open window in the bedroom. Mrs. Rockwell stated that the sound of the flames woke her up.

The Rockwells had \$1,000 insurance on the house, valued at \$3,500 and \$3,000 insurance on the contents, valued at \$6,000. The home was a one-story, four-room structure. The cause of the blaze was unknown.

The Rockwells are presently staying at the Ralph Ross home at Culp Creek, according to Mrs. Catherine Sedergren, local Red Cross representative, and are receiving Red Cross aid. Anyone wishing to donate clothes, furniture or dishes to the Rockwells is urged to contact Mrs. Sedergren, phone 887.

CG Grade School Registration Is Slated August 30

Formal registration for Cottage Grove's elementary schools will be held on Tuesday, August 30, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., according to William G. Oglesby, principal of Jefferson Grade School.

Oglesby said that the school year begins on or before November 15 of the current school year to enter the first grade, Oglesby stated. Since this is a state law, no exceptions can be made, he added.

Highway 99 is the dividing line for place of registration. Those residing on the east side of the highway will register at Harrison

There will be no pre-school clinic this year, according to Miss Dorothy Marshall, county health nurse. Those unable to pay the cost of a physical examination should phone Miss Marshall, 5984 or Mrs. Carlson, 12724.

School and on the west side at Adams School. Registration at a particular school does not imply that the child will attend that school, Oglesby explained.

To register their children, parents must present the child's birth certificate, said Oglesby. State Law requires each entering first grader to have a health examination. Parents are urged to consult the family physician regarding this examination prior to registration. The completed medical examination form should be presented at the time of registration. The Cottage Grove schools provide almost all the school materials each child will need. There is a \$3 fee charged to cover some of the expense for additional art supplies, weekly readers, work books and other incidental items. This fee may be paid at the time of registration.

Phone Expansion Project Lowers Community Rates

Cottage Grove telephone users are benefitting now from a \$19,000 expansion project recently completed by construction crews of The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company.

Manager Bill Hawkins said today that two new telephone lines were added to the so-called Base Rate Area, to more than double its size. This, he pointed out, gave the better "city - grades" of telephone service—one - , two - , and four-party lines to some 25 former suburban subscribers living in the sections added to the Base Rate Area.

In addition, approximately 115 subscribers who were paying mileage charges with their city telephone rates, now have lower telephone bills due to the elimination of the mileage charge within the new BRA.

Lower telephone bills are also now in effect for more than 50 subscribers beyond the new BRA boundary whose mileage charges were reduced as a result of the expansion.

The overall project, which also provided more lines to take care of growth within the city proper, involved placing better than 29,500 feet of new aerial and underground cable. The cables ranged in size from 51 pairs to 303 pairs, Hawkins said.

He described the new BRA boundaries as extending west to just beyond Jones Lane, and south to include Godard Road.

Also added to the BRA was a narrow strip along South River Road, north of Chestnut Avenue, according to Hawkins.

Well over \$1,750 was donated during the Donnie Pyeatt benefit fund weekend activities. Gate contributions for the Play Day Sunday totaled \$374.16; \$291.60 was netted from the dances, while concessions brought in \$413—for a total of \$1,078.76.

Saturday night's dance at the VFW hall netted the fund \$524. Coupled with the Boots and Sandals \$113 effort, dances brought in \$635.

The balance of the money, \$58.30, came from the sale of pies and cakes by non-members of the Riding club, Mmes. Alvis Kelly, Dean Kelly, Dick Kelly and Robert Fox. These ladies sold the pastries during the Play Day. Donnie's special nurses sent down five cakes for the sale.

Approximately 750 attended the Play Day, with 96 participants. About 500 attended the dance at VFW hall.

Play Day program included wild cow milking, team roping, steer riding, bareback riding, pole bending for men, women and children, jackpot events, including calf roping in "A," "B" and "C" groups, several groups of stake races, musical chairs, three match, ed horse races and one free for all race.

There were 19 entries in the "kid's calf riding" contest, which was enjoyed by all the boys and girls from 6-12. This event netted \$3.50.

A registered red polled calf, one week old, given by Mr. Brown of Lynx Hollow, brought \$41 over the auction block.

Two fat lambs, given by Keith White and John Scott of Harrisburg, were sold for \$25, which also added to the fund.

The national guard pictures were the first ones taken on the roll. One of them didn't show up anywhere amongst the negatives. The other was double exposed on the third picture of the roll, which was taken afterwards, while the second picture, also taken afterwards, wasn't double exposed.

President Signs Legislation Letting Holt Bring Home Korean War Orphans

President Eisenhower gave the green light Tuesday to Mr. and Mrs. Harry Holt of Creswell, to adopt and bring home eight war orphans. The waifs consist of four boys and four girls, ranging from one to three years of age.

At present Holt and the youngsters are living in a missionary's home while the family is vacationing. When all the immigration regulations have been complied with, Holt will fly home with his new family. He has been in Korea since May 30 arranging for the adoptions.

At the Holt family home, on Howe Lane near Creswell, Mrs. Holt stated that her husband is anxious to bring the babies to the U.S. as soon as possible for two pressing reasons.

First, he will have to vacate the missionary's home at the end of the month, and other accommodations are non-existent in Seoul. Also, the children with him are off-spring of American soldiers and Korean girls, and because of their Caucasian blood are susceptible to diseases to which Koreans have general immunity. Already Holt and several of the babies have had diarrhea but all of them are now well and ready to travel.

It was different when Holt first took the babies under his wing. Most were undernourished and some were suffering from neglect.
