MPG Members Honor Families With Picnic

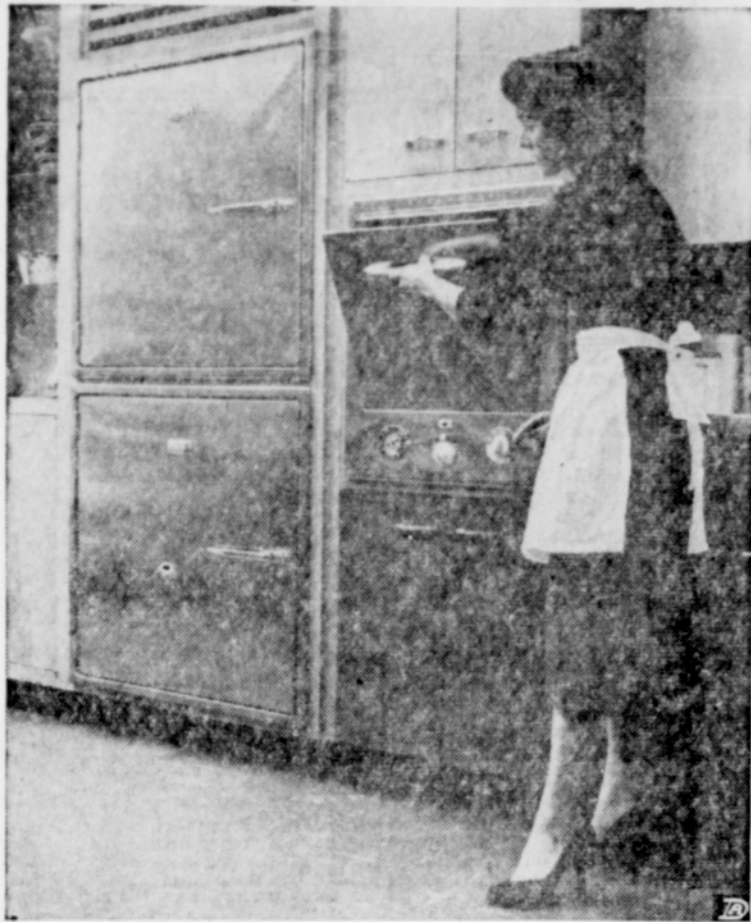

Local Stamp Society Fair Booth To Show Recent Winning Frames

The South Lane Stamp Society is applying finishing touches to its preparations for the booth at the forthcoming Western Oregon Exposition, slated for August 26-28 in Cottage Grove.

The booth, one of several erected in the Cottage Grove Motors warehouse on the corner of 5th and Washington, is being sponsored by V. B. Hoyer, public accountant.

According to Ivan Hoyer, chairman of the Society's fair committee, the booth will display the Society's winning frames of stamps, recently entered in the Northwest Federation of Stamp club show in Eugene. A frame of U. S. souvenir sheets, another of the U. S. flag in stamps, and a frame of Cottage Grove Centennial covers will round out the small exhibition of stamps in the booth.

Beginners, Junior Supplies

The Society is planning to stock the booth with stamps and collectors supplies, with a slant toward the requirements of the beginner and junior collector, as well as the adult specialist. A Kilo mixture of U. S. postage issues, both 19th and 20th century materials in the kilo, and a supplementary kilo of Canadian recent issues are on order for the booth.

Penny pick mixtures for the youngsters, stamp packets for the countries, stamp lots of high value singles and sets for the specialists, and packets of stamps prepared by the members of the South Lane Stamp Society will round out the stamp merchandise to be offered the public attending the three-day fair.

In addition, a large number of sample copies of two of the Nation's foremost Philatelic newspapers, the Western Stamp Collector, published in Albany, Oregon, and the National Stamp News, official organ of the National Philatelic Society, will be distributed at the booth.

Publicizes Organization

The booth was conceived by the Stamp Society as a means of publicizing the organization in the South Lane and North Douglas county areas, and to inaugurate a Society project of assisting the younger set in beginning, or developing stamp collections, through the Society's Junior Collector program. Advice and information about stamps and stamp collecting will be available at the fair booth, and at the Society's regular meetings.

The next South Lane Stamp Society meeting is scheduled for Thursday, August 25, at 7:30 p.m. in the clubroom of the Cottage Grove City Library. Members of the Society are urged to prepare their packets of stamps for the fair and bring them to this meeting.
