It all started last Christmas when Mr. and Mrs. Holt saw a movie depicting the plight of American-Korean children in war-torn Korea. Although they have a family of six children of their own, the Hols decided that they could raise eight orphans on their 353-acre farm. They have a large farm home and some of their own children have reached the age of self-sufficiency.

Special Bill
A refugee relief act limited to two the number of foreign children that any U.S. family can adopt, but the Hols enlisted the aid of neighbors and wrote to Oregon congressional representatives urging that special legislation be enacted to allow adoption of the eight orphans.

Long after Holt had departed for Korea to find his new family additions, the necessary bill was approved and sent to the White House. Thursday, with the President's signature, that bill became a virtual assurance of the success of the Hols' venture.

Woodard Lumber Successful Bidder At Timber Sale

The Eugene Forest District of the Bureau of Land Management sold three tracts of green timber and one tract of salvage timber at the regular monthly sale on August 11, 1955, containing 9,451,000 board feet, mainly Douglas-fir, for a total purchase price of \$354,905.15.

The successful bidders were: W. A. Woodard Lumber company, one tract containing 1,943,000 board feet at \$43.05 per thousand for Douglas-fir; Gustina Bros. Lumber company, two tracts, one containing 5,385,000 board feet at \$42.00 per thousand board feet for Douglas-fir and one tract containing 1,002,000 board feet at \$20.50 per thousand board feet for Douglas-fir; and Johnson Lumber company, one tract containing 1,121,000 board feet at \$63.10 per thousand board feet for Douglas-fir. This represents an increase of 86 percent above the appraised price of \$190,951.35.

The next regular monthly sale will be held September 15, 1955, in Hall A Carpenters Building, 507 Willamette Street, Eugene, Oregon.

Bosses Rate Older

State Hiway Commission Acts on 32 Projects During Recent Bid Hearings

SALEM — (Special) — The Oregon State Highway Commission, meeting last week in Portland, acted on 32 projects, rejecting six sets of bids as being too high. Those accepted totaled \$3,260,174.35.

Largest contract totaling \$881,706 was awarded to General Construction Company, Portland, for the Columbia Street Traffic Interchange in the City of Portland. The contract calls for the construction of two reinforced concrete and steel traffic interchanges over Harbor Drive.

The second largest contract, which was referred to the State Highway Engineer for approval after necessary right-of-way is obtained, had as low bidder Rogers Construction Company, Portland, \$844,000.50 for the Bradley Park-Wauna Section grading and paving project on the Columbia River Highway in Clatsop County.

Smallest Job
Smallest single job acted upon was for the City of John Day, awarded to Lankford Bros., Nyssa, \$7,945. The project includes the surfacing of Main Street and S. W. 2nd Avenue in the City of John Day.

Bids rejected as being too high were for the following projects: Jankin Hill Delmar Screen Planting Project, Oregon Coast Highway in Coos County; Tumalo State Park Latrine in Deschutes County; Ross Island Bridge On-Ramp Section of the Pacific Highway East in Portland; Helmick Park Shelter and Latrine, Polk County; East Parkrose Section of the Columbia River Highway between N. E. 122nd Avenue and N. E. 132nd Avenue, Multnomah County and Holman Park Latrine in Polk County.

Following is action taken by the Commission on other projects, showing low bidders, amounts of low bids, in Lane and Douglas counties.

Lane County
T. W. Thomas of Portland bid \$70,240 for the Goshen - Divide guardrail project on the Pacific Highway. Guardrails will be placed intermittently along 20.8 miles of highway south from Goshen. It is a federal-aid project.

Construction of a 565 foot rein-

forced concrete and steel bridge over South Umpqua River, known as Ford's Bridge, and construction of a 120 foot reinforced concrete highway overcrossing over Yukum Road was awarded to Hamilton and Thomas, Eugene, who bid \$406,161.50. The Myrtle Creek-Canyonville structures are federal aid projects.

Douglas, Jackson, Lane Co.
Knight Percy of Salem bid \$10,416.50 for the Judkins Point-Seven Oaks screen planting project on the Pacific Highway. This state project calls for the intermittent planting of shrubs between Eugene and Central Point.

Cleawox Closes

Camp Cleawox, Girl Scout camp for Three Rivers Girl Scout Council closed Monday for the 1955 camping season, with a total of 418 campers during the season. Chairman of the Cleawox committee, Claude E. Darling, stated that this is the highest the camp has had in several years, due mainly to the expanded capacity of the camp.

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operating much like a petty cash fund.

Revenue for the funds, according to Mrs. Morton, comes from various fees paid each year by pupils. These fees, totaling between \$10 and \$12 annually, are for registration, lab fees, towels and gym fees and books.

The revenue collected is expended for text books, art supplies, towel laundry costs, election board payments and other miscellaneous items.

If it should turn out there is a fund discrepancy, Mrs. Morton explained, this discrepancy might occur through a billing from Gill's Book Store in Portland.

She said there is question concerning the firm's bill for several hundred dollars for the district's purchase of books last school year.

Mrs. Morton explained that the district purchases books each summer and pays the bill in the fall when the pupil fees are paid into the special account fund.

The legality of this fund has also been questioned, Mrs. Morton said. To clarify this matter, the board has asked the attorney general for an opinion.

It is "quite likely," Mrs. Morton said, that the fund will be ruled illegal.

If this happens, the board chairman said, expenditures previously made through the special fund would be included in the future as part of the general fund and appear as regular budgeted items.

Mrs. Morton said a number of school districts throughout the state have special account funds and that the attorney general's ruling might have state-wide effects.
