Unemployment Cut In Summer Months

Summer-time gains continued through last month with the number of jobseekers in Oregon cut to 20,200, lowest in nearly two years, and the amount of payments to the unemployed down to \$533,820, lowest for July since 1952.

Reports from 26 local offices of the State Unemployment Compensation Commission showed 2,200 fewer persons actively looking for jobs than on July 1, and 14,700 fewer than a year ago when a labor dispute in lumber upset the job picture. Only four areas had more unemployed than a month before and two others could find little change.

Although the four-county metropolitan area around Portland reported employment increases during the month, it still had nearly 56 per cent of the state's job-seekers. Best gains came from Willamette valley points while many eastern Oregon districts, partly because of delayed harvests, changed but little.

Only 9,969 covered workers filed claims for the new benefit year, which started July 1. This compared with 18,876 at this time a year ago and with 9,857 in 1953. The weekly claims load was running around 8,500, not much over half of 1954's and about the same as in previous summers.

Over 1200 Fresh To Attend U of O

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, August (Special)—More than 1200 freshmen have already been admitted to the university for fall term, according to J. Spencer Carlson, director of admissions and counseling, who estimated that around 400 more will be admitted by the time the term opens on September 26.

New students are now being admitted at a rate of 15 per cent higher than at this time last year, Carlson says, and he expects the total of new students to reach 2300 to 2400. Total enrollment for the fall will probably surpass the 4900 mark, he believes.

Graduate student applications are up over 1954, records show, while those of transfer students have dropped slightly.

Enrollment for fall term, 1954, was 4439. Registration and orientation of new students has been set for the week of September 18. Classes are scheduled to start on Monday, September 26.
