Ex-War Prisoners Applications for Benefits Due Soon

Korean ex-prisoners of war or their survivors must apply by August 21 for benefits due them under the amended war claims act. Vere A. McCarty, Oregon Department of Veterans Affairs service officer, cautioned today.

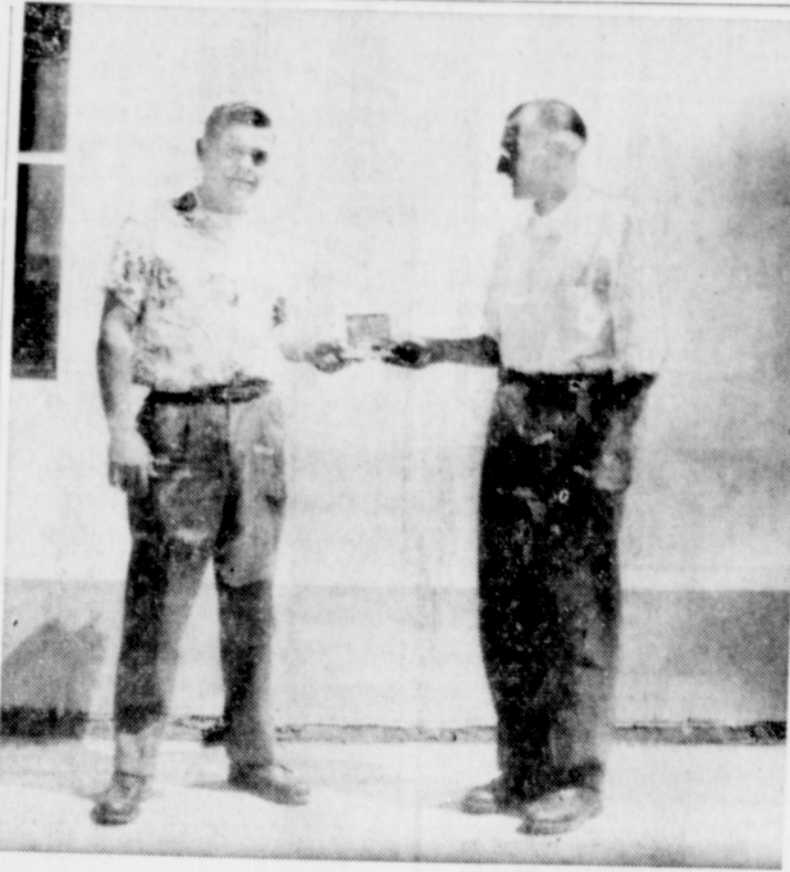
Under the act, American servicemen held prisoner of war during the Korean conflict are entitled to \$250 for each day of captivity during which they failed to receive adequate food and were subjected to forced labor or inhumane treatment.

Applications must be addressed to the Foreign Claims Settlement Commission, Washington 25, D. C., and must be postmarked on or before midnight of the August 21 deadline. No application blanks are available locally, but a letter to the commission should suffice to beat the deadline, McCarty said.

The commission has announced that funds are now available to pay the Korean war prisoner claims, and estimated that the average payment would be \$2000.

The commission has furnished the Oregon veterans' department with the names of seven ex-war prisoners or their survivors who gave their last addresses as Oregon, but who cannot be located by the commission in order to make payment. They are:

July's Lumber Production Down

PORTLAND, OREGON.—(Special)—Lumber production, shipment and order figures through July for the Douglas fir region of Washington and Oregon were released today by Harris E. Smith, secretary of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association.

The weekly average of West Coast lumber production in July was 157,708,000 b.f. or 84.2% of the 1950-1954 average. Orders averaged 182,500,000 b.f.; Shipments 184,631,000 b.f.; Weekly averages for June were: Production, 190,724,000 b.f.; 101.8% of the 1950-1954 average; Orders 202,562,000 b.f.; Shipments 207,686,000 b.f.

Seven months of 1955 cumulative production 5,747,806,000 b.f.; Seven months of 1954, 5,135,868,000 b.f.; Seven months of 1953, 5,910,965,000 b.f.

Orders for seven months of 1955 break down as follows: Rail & Truck 4,347,808,000 b.f.; Domestic Cargo 1,192,151,000 b.f.; Export 136,598,000 b.f.; Local 221,997,000 b.f.

The industry's unfilled order file stood at 822,965,000 b.f. at the end of July, gross stocks at 766,328,000 b.f.
