Scholastic Record Of Frosh, Sophs High in Dorms

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, (Special) — The scholastic record of freshmen and sophomore men in the university indicates the value of dormitory living, according to a report just issued by the office of student affairs.

Four-fifths of the total freshman men enrollment lived in dormitories during the past year, but less than one-half of the disqualified members of the class came from the dorms. The picture, in statistics, is like this — of the 532 men in the first year class, 431 or 80 per cent lived in dormitories.

Of the 112 freshmen men put on "pegged grades," or given a specified grade point average to make the term following an average below 2.00, 63 were from the dormitories.

In the sophomore class, only six of the 32 men disqualified were dormitory residents, and eight of the 30 put on pegged grades were from dorms.
