Local Swimmers Take Second Spot In 4th Annual Area Championships

The South Lane-North Douglas swimmers team, composed of Cottage Grove and Drain, were surprising second place winners at the fourth annual Register-Guard All-Area Swimming Championships held last Thursday night at Springfield's Willamalane pool.

With Delores Pardee's blue ribbon in the 50-yard girls freestyle the only first place local swimmers garnered, and very few second place winners, the South Lane-North Douglas crew piled up most of its points in third, fourth, fifth and sixth places. The locals' 140½ points still has swim judges scratching their heads trying to figure out how it happened.

Eugene Country Club swimmers were far ahead of the pack in points, rolling up a total of 248 for the "Chuck Wiper" revolving team trophy. Behind CG-Drain were Willamalane, 115; Junction City, 105; and Eugene, 101½.

Columbia River Fall Chinook Run Is Forseen Good

To date, there is no evidence that this year's Columbia river fall chinook salmon run will be a failure.

This was the conclusion reached by biologists of the Washington State Fisheries department and the Oregon fish commission at a joint meeting of the two agencies in Portland last Friday. No change in the fall commercial fishing regulations for the Columbia was recommended on the basis of present findings.

The two agencies met to discuss the possibility of a poor fall salmon run this year and to explore measures which might be taken to provide for additional escapement if a small run becomes evident. Biologists explained that the present picture on the size of the fall salmon run could change appreciably as more information becomes available.

Robert J. Schoettler, Washington director of fisheries, and Commissioners John C. Veatch and Robert L. Jones of the Oregon fish commission, advised biologists of the two organizations to continue keeping a close tab on commercial catches as the season progresses.

New Hunt Rules Now Available

A complete synopsis of the 1955 hunting regulations is now available to hunters at all license agencies, the Oregon Game Commission said today.

The synopsis is again of the folding booklet type which proved so popular with sportsmen last year.

Seasons, bag limits and area boundaries are described in full on one side of the synopsis. On the reverse side is a full scale chart of Oregon with the various hunting areas bounded in color.

Below the chart, hunters will also find a complete quick-reference breakdown of the game seasons showing the dates of the open seasons, open areas and bag limits.

The waterfowl regulations will be published in a separate leaflet and should be available to hunters about the middle of September.

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Small Game

PHEASANTS: Statewide.
Open season: October 22 through November 13.
Bag limit: Four cocks per day but not more than twelve in possession at any one time.

JUVENILE PHEASANT SEASON:
Area: Designated portions of E. E. Wilson Game Management area.
Open season: September 17, 18, 24, 25.
Bag limit: Two cocks per day and two quail.

Restrictions: For juvenile hunters from 14 to 17 years of age only. All juveniles to be accompanied by licensed adults over 25 years of age. One adult may accompany not to exceed two juveniles. Adults will not bear arms and will be responsible for the conduct of their charges.

A maximum of 50 juvenile permits will be issued each designated day in order in which applications are received at the Portland office or the Northwest regional office of the Game Commission.

All juvenile hunters and accompanying adults will be required to check in and out of area.

QUAIL AND PARTRIDGE:
Western Oregon: (Counties west of summit of Cascade Mountains).
Open season for Mountain quail: September 10 through September 18. Bag limit: 5 per day and not over 10 in possession.

Open season for Valley and Bobwhite quail: October 22 through November 13, except Clatsop and Marion counties are closed. Bag limit: 5 in the aggregate per day and not over 10 in possession.

No open season for Hungarian partridge.

Eastern Oregon: (Counties east of the summit of the Cascade Mountains).
Open season for Hungarian partridge, valley, bobwhite and mountain quail: October 22 through November 13.

Bag limit: 10 per day and not over 20 in possession, in the aggregate of Hungarian partridge, valley, bobwhite, and mountain quail.

BLUE AND RUFFED GROUSE:
Western Oregon: (Counties west of Cascade Mountains).
Open season: September 10 through September 18.
Bag limit: 3 grouse per day and not over 6 in possession.

Eastern Oregon: (Counties east of summit of Cascade Mountains).
Open season: September 3 through September 11.
Bag limit: 3 grouse per day and not over 6 in possession.

SAGE GROUSE AND CHUKAR PARTRIDGE: No open season.

MOURNING DOVE:
Open season: September 1 through September 25.
Bag limit: Ten per day or in possession.

BAND-TAILED PIGEON:
Open season: September 1 through September 30.
Bag limit: Six per day and not over 24 for the season.

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
