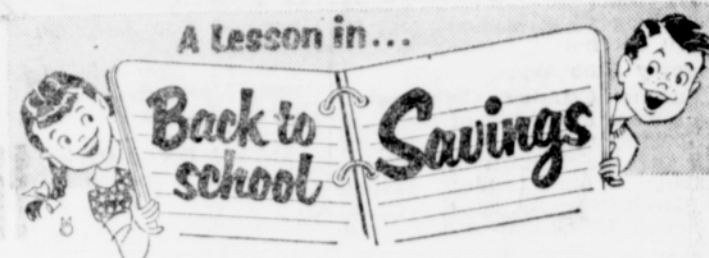
MOUNT VIEW—Mount View school will begin on Tuesday, September 6, and pupils will register the first half day of school.
