Coast Road Strip To Open Sept. 2

SALEM—(Special)—A 4.62-mile section of the Oregon Coast Highway, U. S. Route 101 around Otter Crest between Depoe Bay and Miner Creek will be open for traffic September 2—provided the weather is satisfactory between now and then, the Oregon State Highway Commission announced this week.

The new section provides three lanes of travelway on both sides of the ascending grade for safe passing of slow-moving vehicles. An exceptional view of the coastline is obtainable at Otter Crest. Access roads are provided to the old highway and Otter Crest viewpoint and parking area.

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
