Lane County Fair Sched. Sept. 14-18

"Show What You Grow—Share What You Know" will be the theme of the 1955 Lane County Fair scheduled for Sept. 14-18 at Pioneer Park in Eugene.

In addition to the ever increasing number of exhibits and displays—which last year threatened to overflow every building on the grounds—there will be a variety of special attractions this year. Mrs. Hallie Huntington, fair manager, has reported.

There will be three free midway shows daily. Grandpappy Smith and the Western Valley Boys will give free concerts at 7:15 p.m. Thursday through Saturday on the midway. There will be a big free firefighters show and demonstration Wednesday night in the grandstand arena.

Thursday night there will be Micro-Midget racing in the grandstand. The 1955 Oregon Rodeo Ass'n will be held Friday and Saturday nights and Sunday afternoon. A special carnival children's matinee will be held Thursday, Sept. 15, from 1 to 5 p.m. with all rides ten cents for children.

Again this year fine merchandise prizes are being offered winners in various classes in the culinary and textile divisions. Anyone wishing a fair premium book may write the Lane County Fairgrounds and one will be mailed, or they may be picked up at the grounds during office hours.

Fair officials have been working all year to improve the grounds for the fair. There are new lawns and flower beds, a new swan pond stocked with water fowl, and buildings are being painted. About 500 hanging baskets of fuschias will be used to help decorate the grounds.

Gates will open daily at 9 a.m., and close at 11 p.m. Admission will be 50 cents for adults, 25 cents for children six to 12 years, and children under six free. Season tickets will be \$1.50.

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Pacific Tel., Tel. Features 3-Minute Demonstration of Long Distance Call At Lane County Fair Exhibit Booth

A free, three-minute demonstration long distance telephone call will be one of the main attractions of the Pacific Telephone company exhibit at the Lane County Fair at Eugene, September 14 to 18.

Attractive long distance telephone operators, once every hour, will spin the "Wheel of Fortune" to select a person from the audience to make a call to any place in the United States.

Telephone Company Manager C. W. Hawkins suggests that persons planning to watch the show have ready the phone number of a friend or relative whom they would like to call. If a child should win the free call, one of his parents, or an accompanying adult, will be asked to make the call.

Improvements Displayed Another popular feature of the telephone display will be demonstrations of current technical improvements in the telephone industry. Pretty attendants will show such innovations as a telephone with a lighted dial, handy for use in a bedroom at night.

Also on view will be the newest telephone invention, a "speakerphone" that comes equipped with a microphone and separate speaker. By merely pushing a button a person can hear, and be heard, without lifting the phone receiver.

An automatic answering device, which answers calls while a person is away from home or office, will also be seen.

Telephone users at the exhibit will have a chance to see how they work when making a call. Four talented girl artists on duty will draw sketches giving their impressions of various telephones in action.

Speed with which a long distance call can travel across country will be shown in placing a call direct from the exhibit location at the fair grounds to the Weather Bureau in Chicago.

Another interesting bit of telephone "magic" will be seen in the "Human Telephone Line" by which operators will point out how the human body can act as a conductor of electricity to produce sound.

All these various demonstrations in the Telephone Company's display, "Fun With Sound," can be seen during the hours that the Fair is open each day from 2 p.m. to 10 p.m.
