

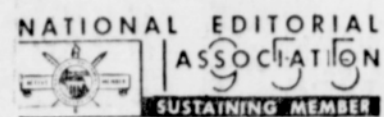
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Fruits of Cooperation

Herman Petersen, chairman of the Retail Merchants committee of the Chamber of Commerce, commented in last week's meeting of the general membership that Cottage Grove merchants were showing a fine spirit of cooperation. This spirit of cooperation is what made Cottage Grove's first annual Fall Opening a very successful event, likely to be repeated in the ensuing years. A total of 71 prizes were offered by 53 participating merchants, who purchased a grand total of 46,500 "Treasure Hunt" tickets to be given to the public—a very high ratio of cooperation.

Whether or not this is because of or despite the absence of a Chamber Manager is a moot point, but the fact remains that as long as this spirit of cooperation lasts, Cottage Grove's future will look bright.

OUT OF BALANCE

Last year the 100,000 victims of poliomyelitis in this country benefited to the extent of approximately \$50 million through the March of Dimes campaign. This amounted to a contribution of about 30 cents from every man, woman and child in the United States.

A number of other causes are worthy of at least equal support. There are in the nation 200,000 victims of muscular dystrophy, 250,000 with multiple sclerosis, 400,000 with tuberculosis, 600,000 with cerebral palsy, 700,000 with cancer, 2,500,000 with mental disease (under treatment alone), 7,500,000 with arthritis and rheumatism, and well over 16 million with heart disease (which alone causes 800,000 deaths each year). No fund campaign for the benefit of any of these groups has succeeded in collecting half as much as the March of Dimes.

On a purely arithmetical basis it seems that if one gave 30 cents to poliomyelitis one should have given 60 cents to muscular dystrophy, 75 cents to multiple sclerosis, \$1.20 for tuberculosis control, \$1.80 to cerebral palsy, \$2.10 to cancer, \$7.50 to mental disease, \$22.50 to arthritis and rheumatism and \$48 to heart disease.

Actually, the mythical average citizen gave only eight cents to the campaign against heart disease, 14 cents toward cancer eradication, 15 cents for Christmas seals (tuberculosis) and about 1 1/4 cents to multiple sclerosis. Other campaigns fared no better. The same average citizen spent at least \$30 for cigarettes.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

Even a mildly intelligent calling knows enough not to bite the hand that's feeding him.

But it appears many federal, other government workers are unaware of this fact, because they are now owning and operating discount retail outlets.

This project apparently started in Los Angeles where federal government workers started a business called FEDCO. This venture into socialism now operates 3 C. W. Harder stores covering 160,000 square feet, employs 100, did a \$10 million business last fiscal year.

In fact, FEDCO even has its own private brands, selling among other things, its own brand of bourbon known as "Old FedCal."

In addition, Los Angeles city and county, as well as state employees operate an organization called MORE doing about \$7 million per year. Similar operations have been opened in Northern California.

Everything from fresh cut flowers to furniture and heavy appliances are sold in these stores, including of course, the government worker's own brand of booze "Old FedCal." To trade in these outlets and get the discounts offered government workers must show cards which indicate they are government workers, just as Russia card card carrying communists show their cards to receive special benefits in buying.

Thus, those who are supported in a large part by taxes paid by American retailers and wholesalers operating in the American free economy, are seeking to sabotage the people and system that pays their salaries. At the same time, through Washington lobbyists, they try to "boot-jack" these same taxpayers for higher wages and benefits.

The time has long since passed when government employment can be considered low paid. In addition to good pay schedules, there are paid vacations, annual sick leaves, other benefits.

It is also interesting to note there are so many federal employees in Southern California it is possible for them to support a private department store chain as well as their own private brand.

This well illustrates sickness that stalks the land.

Wonder over Russian intentions, fuss raised over loyalty oaths, similar matters, pale into insignificance beside this fact.

Government workers have turned their backs on private enterprise to embrace socialism. Today it's a buying commune, tomorrow it may be a social commune, following day a political commune, and following day is anybody's guess.

Russian pattern is followed in other ways, too. In Russia communism was promoted by least productive element, those who made little, if any contribution to the economy.

In U. S. socialism is being promoted by government workers.

State Deer Hunt For 1955 Season Opens October 1

October 1 marks the day for approximately 200,000 nimrods as they take to the woods for the opening of Oregon's general deer season.

From all indications, hunters should enjoy a banner year as census trends show that deer populations are up over last year's trend throughout most of the big game ranges. Last year a record harvest of more than 112,000 animals were taken.

The first 14 days will be for buck deer only, with antlers of at least two points or better. In Jackson, Josephine, Douglas, Coos and Curry counties and that part of Klamath county south of highway 230 and west of highway 97, the buck deer season will extend through October 21.

The general buck season will be

followed by a 7-day either sex season throughout most parts of Oregon beginning October 15 and extending through October 21. The Deschutes national forest in central Oregon, however, will have a 3-day closure following the general buck season and will then be open for either sex deer beginning October 18 and extending through October 21. All of eastern Oregon will be open for either sex deer hunting with the exception of Sherman county, which will remain closed.

West of the Cascade summit the either sex deer areas are confined primarily to agricultural lands and adjacent areas. Hunters are urged to read the game synopsis for the open areas in western Oregon.

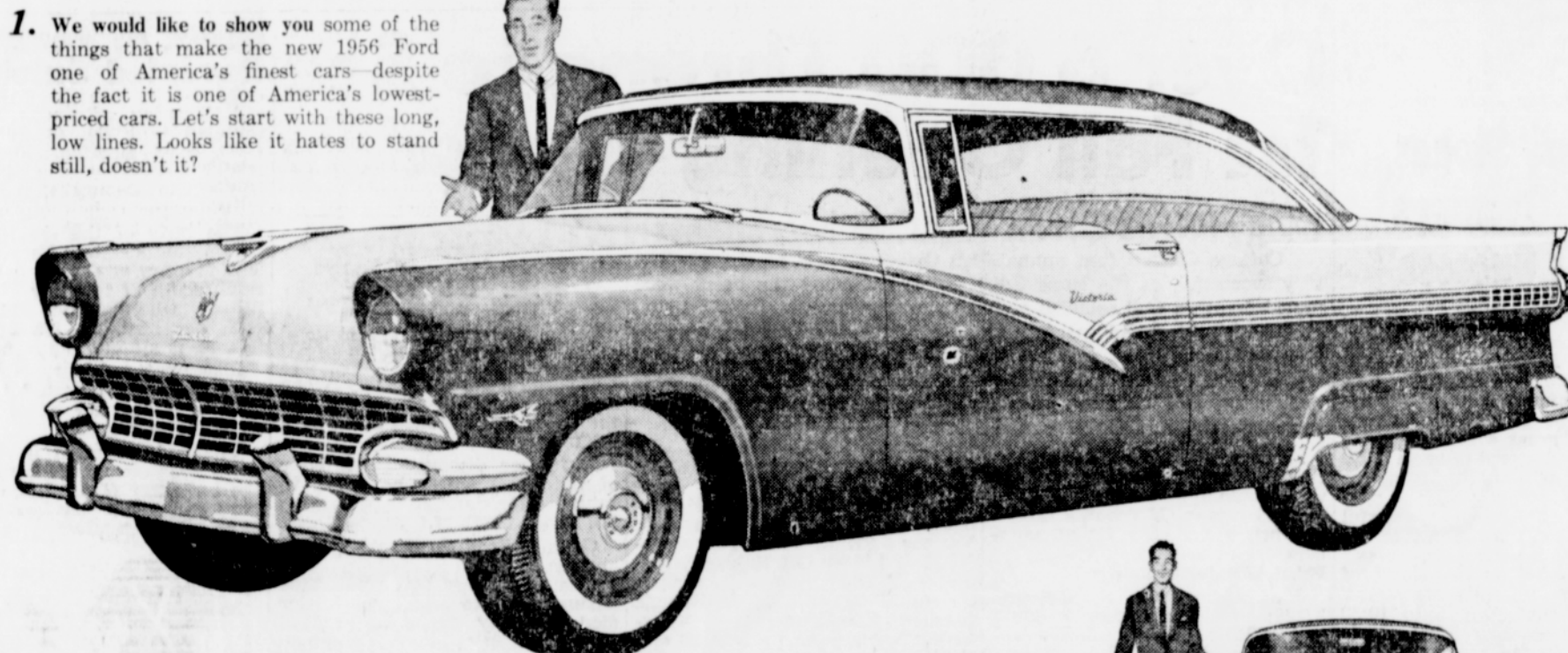

One Fire Closure Set in Fremont

Only one fire closure to deer hunters was in effect as of midnight Wednesday, that on the Summer Lake rim in the Fremont forest. All other closures were lifted as of midnight last night.

Vendis Miller, supervisor of the Umpqua forest, told the Sentinel yesterday that the forest service expects the greatest fire difficulty to be with abandoned camp and warming fires because of the cooler weather. He emphasized that most forests on the east side of the state have only had 1 to 10 inch or less of rain in the last 24 hours, and that that had been spotty, with high winds speeding forest drying.

In the south, Miller said, the forests have had little or no moisture, and the weather bureau expects no appreciable moisture for the east side areas for several days.

The Oregon Game Commission warns all hunters that the hazard of forest or range fires is continuously with us and urges all hunters to be extremely careful in every way while in the forests or range lands while on their hunting trips.
