

## Cottage Grove Gridders Rated Ninth in Oregon By AP Poll

Cottage Grove's football team was rated ninth in the state by the weekly Associated Press poll last week. The ballots were cast a week ago, so Grove's 39-0 victory over Willamette might place the Lions higher up on the 1955 prep football ladder.

Cottage Grove made its jump into the top 10 on the strength of a 20-13 win over Eugene, its first victory over the Axemen in 42 years.

Corvallis, forced to share the lead with South Salem last week, moved up all alone to the top of the poll as the Spartans dumped Lebanon 31-6 last weekend. The victory brought 190 points in the voting by Oregon sports writers and sportscasters. Ten of the 21 casting ballots voted for Corvallis in the No. 1 spot.

Marshfield moved up to the No. 2 position, drawing eight votes for first place, while South Salem skidded into third, getting three votes for first place. Marshfield was hard on the heels of Corvallis in the voting, getting 187 points. South Salem had 180.

Marshfield moved up from No. 3 by whalloping Grants Pass, 27-6. South Salem slipped, observers apparently not being impressed by

## Outweighed Ducks to Try Colorado At Friendly Hayward Field Saturday

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene (Special)—For the fourth straight game, Oregon's Ducks will head into a game heavily outweighed in both the line and backfield. Coach Len Casanova's Ducks will meet the University of Colorado in the first Eugene game of the season for the Webfoots, Saturday afternoon.

Being outweighed will be nothing new to the Ducks this year, battling the bulk in all three of their previous games, against Utah, USC and Washington. The Ducks will carry a starting lineup to the Eugene fracas that averages 205 to the man, and a five pound heavier 210 for each of the linemen.

Colorado, under Del Ward, has possibly its best team in several years. They are heavily favored in the Big Seven conference. With depth to go along with the size, Ward has been alternating two complete units thus far this season.

Biggest men on the Buffalo roster and likewise in the starting lineup are tackles Sam Salerno, 227, and Dick Golder, 221. Compared to the Colorado average, Oregon will start a line that figures 199 to the man and a backfield that averages 180.

What the Webfoots lose in weight, they hope to pick up in backfield speed and overall team speed. Jim Shanley, Dick James and Jack Morris have been cutting some fancy and lightning-like paths through the first three Duck games and should offer Colorado something to chase. Likewise in the line, Oregon has formidable speed, with four of the first stringers converted backfield men from high school.

Biggest weakness thus far in the Oregon attack has been a lack of passing to balance what Casanova believes to be the best running attack at Oregon in several years.
