ENROLLMENT INCREASES OREGON COLLEGE OF EDUCATION

Enrollment at the Oregon College of Education reached the 700 mark at noon today. This is the highest enrollment recorded in a regular session for 25 years, and the highest ever since becoming a degree-granting institution. Of the total figure 355 were men, and 345 were women. One year ago at a comparable time, the enrollment was 593.

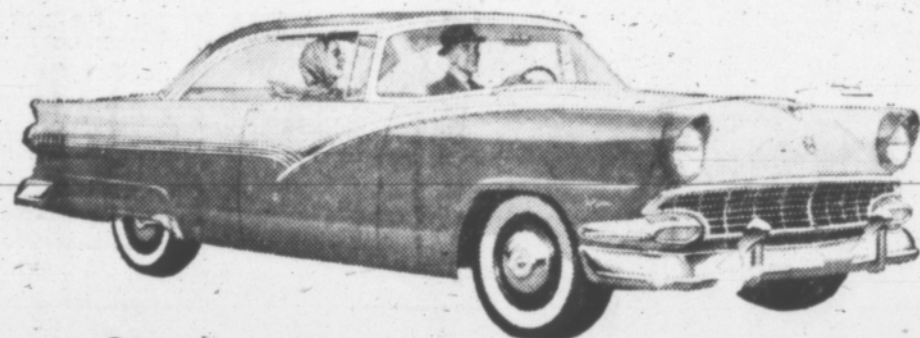

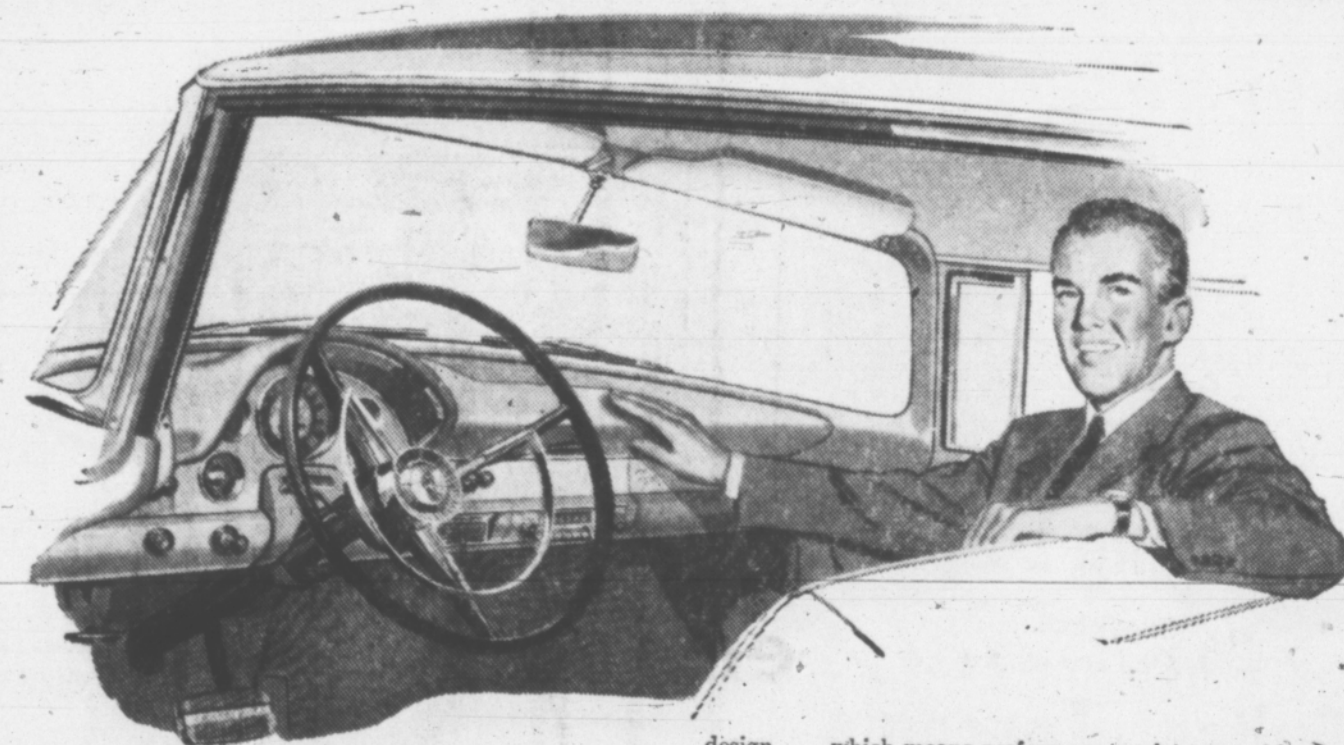
Persons wishing original licenses or permits to drive are asked to file applications well ahead of the scheduled closing hour in order to assure time for completion of the required license test.

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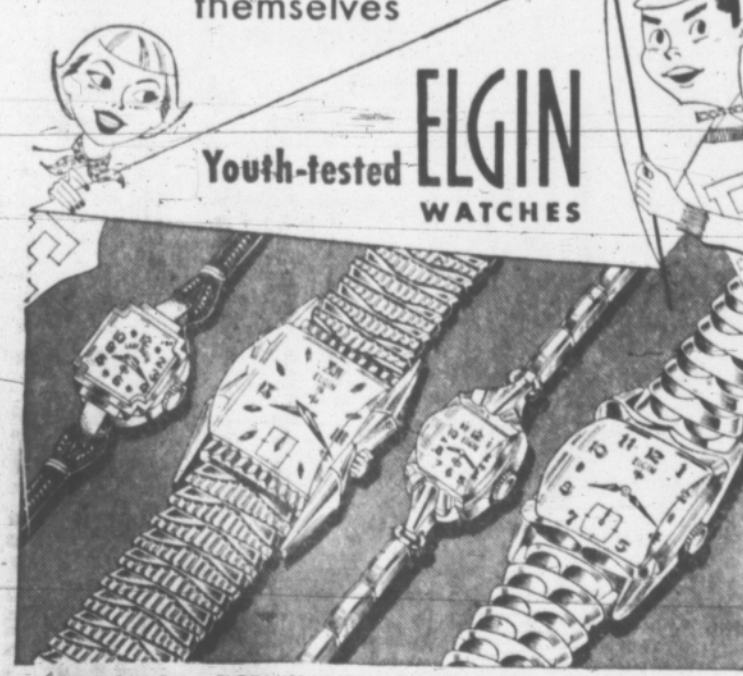
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
