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## Oregon Freshmen Athletes Fine Crop

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene (Special)—Oregon's freshmen athletic picture for the 1955-56 year will have some 94 athletes on hand, including 12 members of the Shrine all-star football selections.

Football got the biggest crop of the freshmen students, who went through their first week of school, this week. Coach Jerry Frei, who will begin frosh practice October 10, will have 36 men on hand.

Totals for rest of the sports will see 27 in baseball, 22 in track and 13 in basketball, plus three junior college transfers who will step right into varsity competition. JC transfers who will bolster coach Bill Borchers' Duck eagles are Charlie Johnson, Los Angeles city college; Nick Urt, North Idaho JC, and John Vescevic, North Idaho JC.

Heading the list of Shriners now in the Duck athletic plant is Gene Schutler, Oswego, chosen the game's most valuable player. Other Shriners include: Walt Burgher, St. Helens; Mike DeVore, Medford; Darrel Gohl, Stayton; John Johnson, Coos Bay; Herb Juran, South Salem; Don Laudenslager, Gresham; Larry Newsum, South Salem; Willard Reeve, North Bend; Jack Sime, Gresham; Bob Sturges, Milwaukie and Jerry Walling, Salem.
