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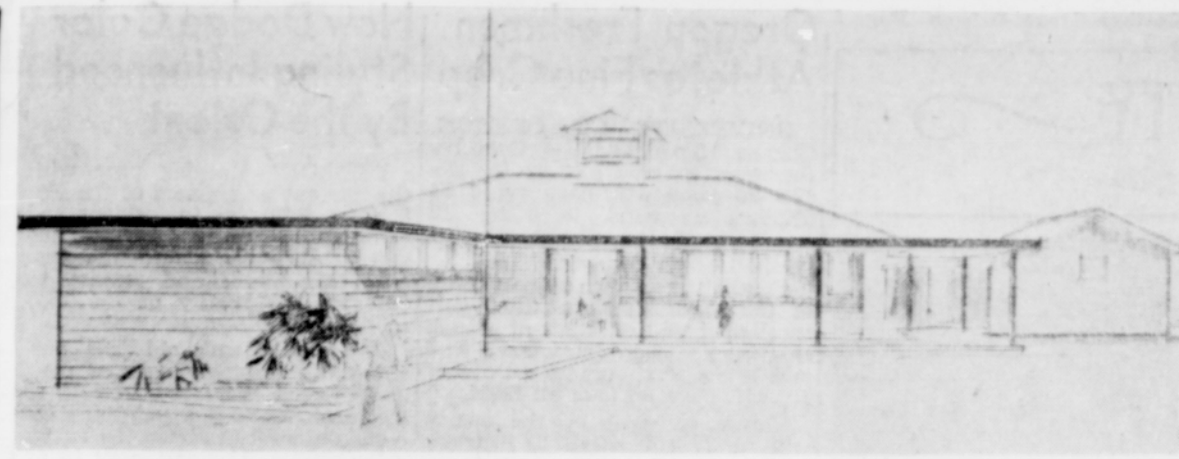

New Ford Styling Theme Is Told

The styling theme of the Continental Mark II, defined as "modern formal," emphasizes the use of clean lines to achieve an effect of simplicity and elegance.

Under the direction of William C. Ford, vice president of Ford Motor Company and general manager of the Continental Division, stylists of the Continental Mark II have attempted to retain in modern form the enduring proportions of the former Lincoln-Continental.

The term "modern formal styling" was adopted at the outset, according to Chief Stylist John M. Reinhardt, to establish direction in designing a conservative automobile of superior quality with emphasis on honesty of line rather than on artificial styling devices.

Use of Sheet Metal
"Maximum effect of Continental styling is evident in the functional use of sheet metal, chrome and glass," Reinhardt said.

"For example, the rear fenders, bumpers and grille are blended with the basic body to achieve an integration of all components in a unified design."

"We have maintained generally the over-all ratio of hood length to passenger compartment length to rear deck length of the former Lincoln-Continental. It was a distinctive car deserving of the term 'classic' because it has withstood the test of time and looks modern 15 years after it first appeared."

Although the fashionable spare tire mount of the Lincoln-Continental has become a familiar accessory on many cars, it seemed unreasonable to name a car "Continental" without this feature in some form, Reinhardt said.

"So we decided on a delicately moulded surface in the deck lid to cover a tire mounted at an angle in the rear of the luggage compartment, giving us a feature appropriate to the styling of the new car," he added.

New Frame
He pointed out that a new frame developed by Continental engi-

neers, which in effect serves as a cradle to occupants, made it possible to reduce by several inches the height of the car and to accentuate the long, low appearance without restricting passenger comfort. The car is 4 feet 8 inches high, more than 18 feet long and 6½ feet wide.

With a gently sloping wrap-around windshield, comparatively deep windows and a wide rear glass, the Continental Mark II uses 21 square feet of glass area to enhance visibility and increase safety. The closed roof quarter characteristic of the Lincoln-Continental is retained to provide rear-seat privacy but does not restrict rearward vision.

"We have avoided superfluous ornamentation, as exemplified by the discreet use of chrome on the Continental Mark II," Reinhardt said.

"To achieve full effect of highlights and styling detail, we have concentrated on the contours of fine-quality sheet metal that is finished and painted by a process that has no equal in the industry."

Interior and exterior colors, selected with the "modern formal" theme in mind, are more subdued than those found on many of today's automobiles.

Reinhardt said, "We believe the Continental owner to be conservative in his tastes, and we feel that restrained color selections in keeping with the styling of the car will suit him best."

Power Company Gets Stock Issue

Authorization by the Federal Power Commission to issue 30,000 shares of its 4.52 per cent serial preferred stock, par value \$100 per share, has been received by Pacific Power & Light Company.

Similar authorizations as required by state regulatory authorities in the area in which Pacific Power operates also have been received and a registration statement covering the issue has been filed with the Securities Exchange Commission. The registration statement, a pre-requisite to sale of the shares, is expected to become effective October 5.

Proceeds of the preferred stock, along with the sale of \$10,000,000 of 30-year first mortgage bonds also covered in the Federal Power Commission and other authorizations, will be used to help finance Pacific Power's construction program in 1955-56. The company already has invited bids for the bonds.

The preferred stock, first issued by the company in many years, will be offered to the public at \$102 per share. It will be handled by a large number of investment brokers throughout the company's service area.

The 30,000 shares represent the first series to be issued by the company out of a total of 200,000 shares of serial preferred stock authorized by the stockholders in October, 1954.

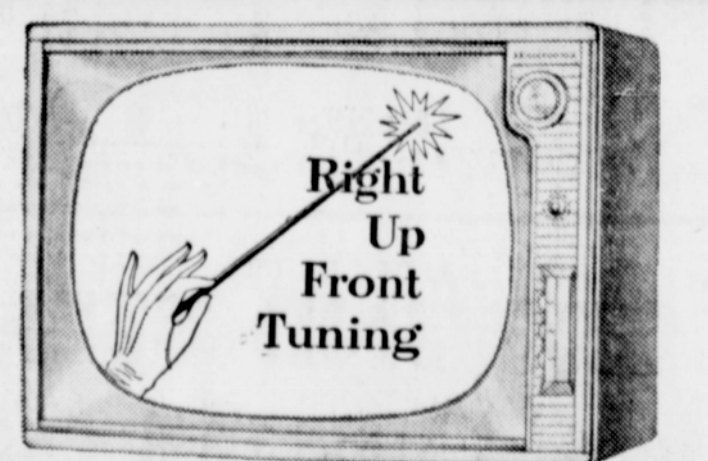
