'Bamboo Curtain' Refugees Receive CARE Aid Boost

CARE aid for "Bamboo Curtain" refugees and other needy people in free Indo-China is being extended to Laos, where famine-ridden neighbors of Vietnam are suffering from the havoc of two severe droughts and devastation of invasion.

On information from the CARE Mission Chief that actual famine conditions exist in Laos, CARE is preparing for immediate distribution of four special packages—food, cotton, mosquito netting and blankets—ranging from \$4 to \$6.

"Hunger is the great enemy the Laotian people are facing," the CARE Mission Chief explains, "and the larger cities of the country are over-run with refugees from its own northern provinces and other parts of Indo-China. After the fall of Dienbienphu, over 5,000 people, most of them women and children, flocked into Vietnam alone."

In the northern provinces, which bore the brunt of guerrilla fighting, according to the mission chief, the fields are still sown with mines instead of grain and the villagers have no tools to remove these death traps. In the south, hardest hit by the continuous drought, farmers have begged for just enough food to keep alive while they sow a new crop of rice.

CARE, the non-profit foreign relief agency, was first private agency to come to the aid of the Indo-China after the cease-fire in Vietnam.

Contents of the packages available to American donors for Laos include 25 pounds of rice, salted fish, sea salt and other necessities; 10 yards of cotton drill plus 1000 yards of sewing thread, needles, buttons, a towel and laundry soap in the \$6 cotton parcel; a 30 x 7 1/2 foot mosquito net for \$3 and a woolen blanket package for \$4.

Orders for any of these packages or contributions in any amount for Laos may be sent to the Northwest CARE office, Seattle, or any local CARE outlet. Distribution of food and other packages for Vietnam and Laos is closely supervised by CARE mission personnel and is based strictly on need.

Oldest Living Trees Featured in Magazine

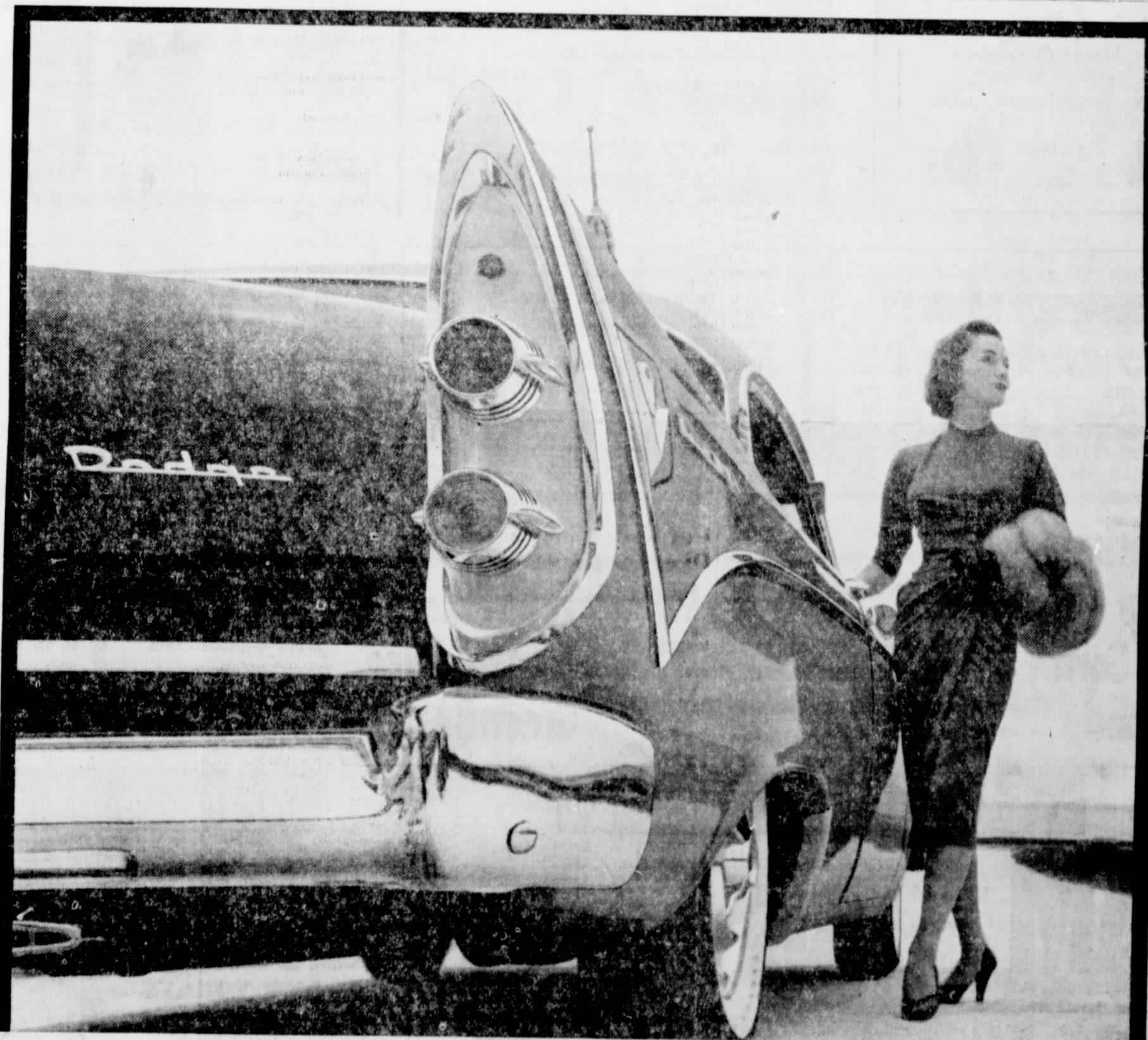
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
