SALEM (Special)—The Bureau of Public Roads, in cooperation with the several states, installed automatic traffic recorder stations in various parts of the United States, and they have been in operation for a number of years. There are 22 such stations in Oregon, according to R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer.

Recently the Bureau published the trends of traffic during the last year, Oregon is the tenth state in gain in traffic with 8 percent, which represents an increased traffic in July 1955 over July 1954. The highest gain was in Florida with 17 percent.

Does Bad Climate Cause Colds?

No, colds occur in widely different climates at about the same season. They affect about the same percentage of people in one region as in another. Apparently the greatest contributing factor is the change to indoor crowding, especially in schools, during the winter months. Children acquire and transmit the disease more readily than adults.

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
