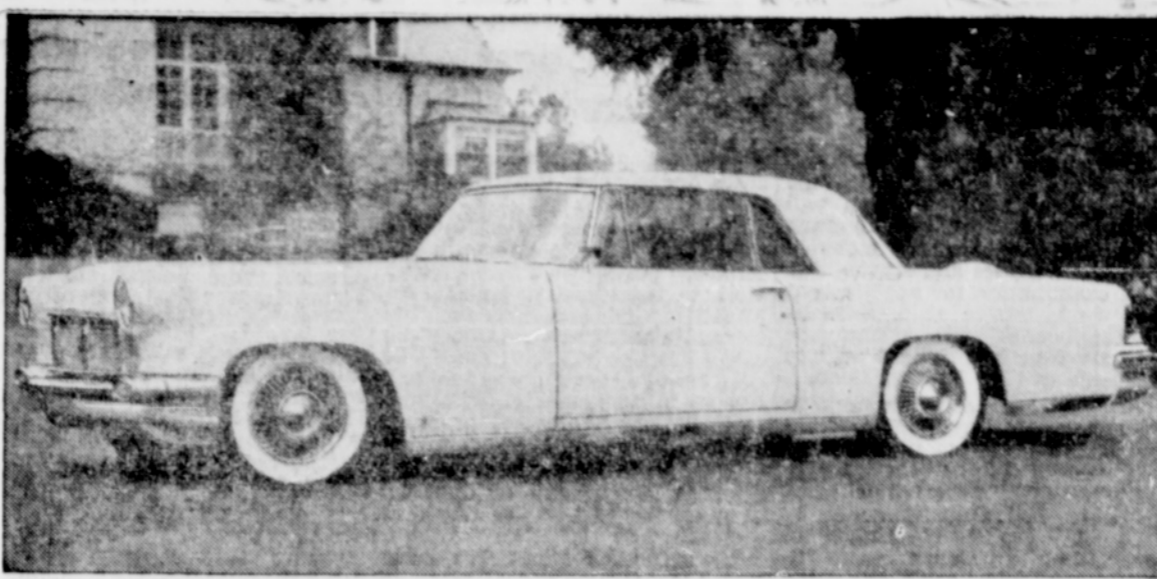

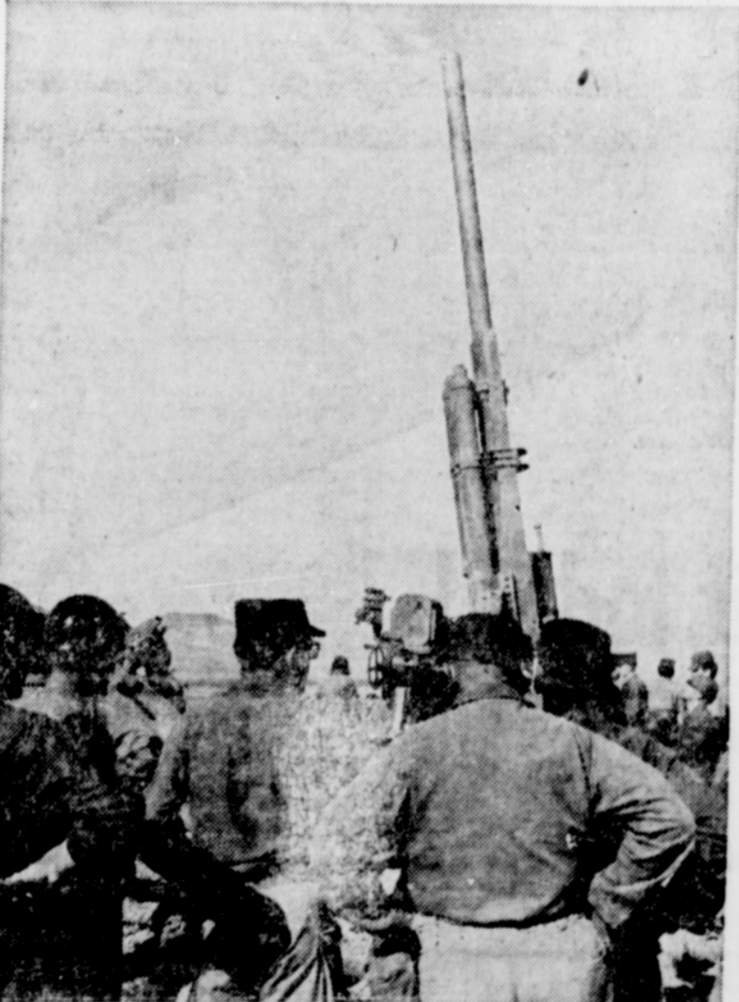

The "modern formal" design emphasizes the functional use of chrome, steel and glass areas. The hood is almost six feet long, and the car is more than 18 feet long. Four inches less than five feet high, it is believed to be the lowest production car with both a front and rear seat. A new frame design and the 77 $\frac{1}{2}$ inch width of the car insure ample room for all occupants.

'Dogs Point Way,' Say Foresters

SALEM, OREGON—The Oregon state forestry department defended its bloodhounds this week, saying the dogs did point out the trail of the two missing Portland women, who were later found close to the Columbia River Highway.
 The question of why the bloodhounds, owned by Norman Wilson of the state forestry department, failed to find Mrs. Avera Ferguson and Mrs. Bernice Sharkey, lost for several days in the forests of the Larch Mountain area east of Portland, has been asked by many, especially those familiar with bloodhounds and their work.
 The question also came from men who were on the Fanno Mountain search in Polk county where the dogs led searchers to the bodies of three persons after following a cold, rainy 12-day-old trail. This feat is currently being considered for the record books in so far as cold trail is concerned.

Human Element to Blame
 The answer comes from Norman Wilson, state forestry department warden, who took the hounds on the Larch Mountain hunt. He said it was the human element and not the fault of the hounds. The two women had been trailed from their car to the edge of a 500-foot cliff overlooking the Columbia river.
 Wilson said the dogs, led by Bernice, strained to go over this cliff, but the men held them back. It was assumed that the women might have fallen and crashed to their death on the rocks below. A search failed to reveal any bodies and the opinion of the bloodhounds, Doc, Kate and Bernice, was overruled.
 After Mrs. Ferguson and Mrs. Sharkey were found alive and well, it came out that they had scrambled down the cliff at the exact point where the dogs wanted to go down, north of the concrete wall.

Descend Steep Slope
 One of the women had dropped her purse and the two of them had made their way safely down the treacherous, steep cliff to the bottom. Seeing that it was impossible to retrace their steps, they made their way toward the Columbia River highway where they were later found by searchers.
 Mrs. Ferguson and Mrs. Sharkey defended the dogs' judgment. Norman Wilson has the highest confidence in his five hounds. "If they climb up a tree, I'll go right on up," Wilson said. "We must have confidence in the dogs."
 At Salem, Bernice, spokesman for Doc Holiday and Big Nose Kate, the other hounds on the search, wasn't a bit red faced over the affair. She even looked a little smug.

The five bloodhounds are a public service furnished by the Oregon state forestry department for locating lost persons in the timberlands. Queen Guinevere and Tillie are the other two dogs.
