

Grovers Bite Bulldogs Four Times for 27 to 18 Victory

Cottage Grove racked up its fifth consecutive win of the season Friday as the Lions dumped a strong North Bend grid squad 27-18 at Curran Field.

The Grovers piled up two scores in the initial period, added more in the next two quarters and were knocking on the door for another TD as the game ended. Two additional Lion scores were thwarted by fumbles; in the first period by a fumble on the Bulldog's 8-yard marker, and in the last 30 seconds of the first half, when Jim Nichols booted over from the 1-yard line and dropped the ball to North Bend.

"Bad breaks" were almost equal on both sides as a Bulldog score, culminating from Shanley's 52-yard gallop, was nullified because of a penalty.

North Bend took a quick 6-0 lead with slightly over a minute in the first period gone. The Bulldogs scored in four plays, highlighted by an 18-yard pass play and Arlis Akin's 44-yard gallop for the TD around right end.

Grove Scores
Grove was behind for a few minutes only, as Nichols scooted over from the 13 and added a bonus point to give CG a 7-6 margin which was never topped. Nichols ran for a total of 53 yards in three plays for most of the distance. Larry Burlison recovered a

round left end, aided by a couple of good stiff arms, on third down and 25 to go for the first down. Nichols and Angell changed off to bring the ball to the 11. A couple of penalties put Grove back to the 30 and as North Bend watched No. 71 and 45, Castle boomed around for the score.

Near Miss
Castle almost gave Grove another tally in the first half as he blocked a Bulldog punt, fell on it and two plays later ran 3 yards to the 1-yard line, but on the next play a fumble returned the ball to North Bend.

A fourth down pass to Nichols, who missed his first PAT, from Quarterback Leon Hayes, put Grove ahead 27-12 in the third period. An intercepted pass on CG's first play eventually put North Bend on Grove's 29, but a like effort by Nichols, plus a 27-yard return, returned the ball to CG on its 39. Cutting up the turf 20 yards at a whack, Nichols and Castle brought the ball into scoring territory. Castle scored on a 10 yard bolt, the score was nullified on a penalty, but the Hayes to Nichols aerial finally gave the Lions the score.

The visitors concluded the scoring in the fourth quarter when they nabbed a blocked kick on the Lion's 20. John Schnick passed to Shanley for nine yards and the tally.

Thwarts Efforts
Two intercepted passes aided Grove in the waning minutes of the game. Dean Cramer intercepted a pass on the Lion's 11 and returned to the 44, and Nichols' interception gave Grove the ball on North Bend's 20 as the game ended.

Two Lions received injuries during the game. Hayes was knocked out in the last quarter, and remained unconscious for five minutes. Tackle Henry Martin received a dislocated knee, and will be out for the season.

The Lions travel to Prineville Friday and are favorites to nab their sixth straight win of the season.

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Ducks, Golden Bears to Renew Grid Rivalry at Multnomah Stadium Sat.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene (Sports)—One of the closest and most hotly contested inter-school rivalries on the Pacific Coast will boil anew in Portland next Saturday when Oregon's Ducks take on California's Golden Bears in a Multnomah stadium contest.

Oregon with George Shaw beat California with Paul Larson a year ago in Memorial stadium at Berkeley, 33-27, in a real thriller.

Hart Mt. Deer Hunt Successful

Deer hunters participating in the Hart mountain controlled season, September 24 through September 27, experienced one of the best hunts in the annals of Oregon hunting, the Oregon Game Commission said today.

Of the 198 nimrods who checked in and out of the Hart mountain area, 177 were successful in bagging a deer for almost a 90 per cent success ratio.

Without a doubt, most hunters were looking for the trophy bucks that rumors had it were roaming the Hart mountain rimrocks. Surprisingly few deer were taken during the 4-day hunt. Although some big bucks with wide antler spreads were checked out, there were no mossy-backed hat-racks taken. Whether any of these big racks will enter the records remains to be seen.

Of the bucks taken, there were 24 with five points, 51 with four points, 35 with three points, and 23 forked-horns. The remainder were unclassified bucks with two points or more and does and yearlings.

The last time the Hart mountain was hunted with rifle was during the 1943 and '44 seasons when special controlled hunts were held to reduce the herds which were overbreeding the range. This year's hunt was again called to bring a reduction in the population of deer and balance the herds with the available food supply.

clubs dates back to 1899 when the Bears dumped Oregon 12-0. But the real rivalry started in 1941 when Oregonaced the California 10-7. Since then it has been a nip-and-tuck battle each year. California holds the edge from the 1941 game, in the series, 3-4 with one tie. That one tie came in 1953 when Len Casanova's Webfoots held the Bears to a 0-0 stalemate.

A year ago California scored 14 points in the initial period, only to go scoreless in the second and third and then come back with 13 for the finale. For Oregon, it was exactly the other way around. They pounded home 33 points in the second and third frames.

A year has gone since that afternoon in Berkeley and likewise gone are such standouts as Larson and Max Hazeltine for California, and Shaw, Jack Patera, Jasper, McGee, and many others for the Ducks. But both clubs have shown prospects in recent games and chances are promising for a wide open contest.
