McKay, Thailand Educator to Get Hon. OSC Degrees

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Two honorary doctor's degrees will be conferred by Oregon State college at its 88th Charter Day observance October 27.

They will go to Douglas McKay, secretary of the interior and a 1917 OSC graduate, and Luang Suwan, rector of Thailand's Kasetsart university, which has technical assistance contract with the college.

It will be the first time in OSC history that honorary degrees have been awarded apart from regular commencement exercises and the first time a leader from a foreign country has been so honored.

The degrees will be conferred at a special 2:15 p.m. convocation in the coliseum, according to President A. L. Strand. The public is invited. Speaker will be Dr. Clifford M. Hardin, chancellor of the University of Nebraska.

McKay, who was named to the cabinet in 1952 by President Eisenhower, got his introduction to politics at OSC. He was elected freshman class president in 1913 and student body president in 1917. He missed graduation exercises, however, because he entered military service before commencement. After army service, he settled in Salem where he was president of the chamber of commerce and later mayor, state senator and then governor.

Suwan is an internationally-known poultry scientist and educator. Under his leadership, Kasetsart university has made notable growth and development in training scientists for Thailand. The university, located at capital-city Bangkok, is interested in most of the same fields as OSC.

OSC and Kasetsart signed a technical aid pact last year. It provided for OSC to send a team of scientists to that country to help in expansion and development plans and to bring Kasetsart teachers to this country for advanced study. Seven OSC staff members are now in Thailand and nine Thai teachers are studying at OSC.

The meeting at which Lady Baden-Powell will speak is sponsored jointly by the Three Rivers Girl Scout Council, and the University of Oregon Student Body and will be a part of the university series for this year. In addition to her role as Chief Guide, Lady Baden-Powell is also the widow of Lord Baden-Powell, who founded the Boy Scouts and started the world wide Scouting movement.

The Girl Scouts, a Red Feather Community Chest agency, are planning the meeting to emphasize the International aspect of the Girl Scouts, and are planning a Cleanwax Chorus, a flag ceremony representing all troops who have troop or American flags, and a pageant as a closing to the evening.

Navy Sets Dec. 10 For NROTC Exam

The tenth annual competitive examination for high school seniors who desire to attend college and train for careers as Naval officers will be held throughout the nation on December 10, the Navy announced today. Applications for the NROTC are now available, but must be received by November 19, the announcement added.

Successful candidates will start their Naval careers in colleges and universities across the country in 1956, with substantial financial assistance from the government. After a normal college education, graduates will be commissioned in the Regular Navy or Marine Corps, for active duty with the Fleet throughout the world.

Male citizens of the United States, between the ages of 17 and 21 are eligible to apply for the NROTC aptitude test. Persons who attain a qualifying score will be given the Navy's rigid midshipman physical examination next February. From the pool of qualified candidates remaining in competition, approximately 1,800 young men will be selected for young men to the NROTC, and the college of their choice.

Students enrolled in the Regular NROTC program will spend their summers on training cruises with the Fleet, and will receive \$600 annual "retainer" pay until commissioned. In addition to the normal college curriculum, the midshipmen will study a planned course in Naval Science. All tuition, fees and books will be furnished by the Navy.

This college training program is also open to enlisted men on active duty in the Navy and Marine Corps. Such candidates will be selected under a separate quota established for the services.

Applications are now available at all high schools, colleges, and U. S. Navy Recruiting Stations, or direct from the Chief of Naval Personnel, Washington 25, D. C.
