Golf Places Given For Summer Tourn.

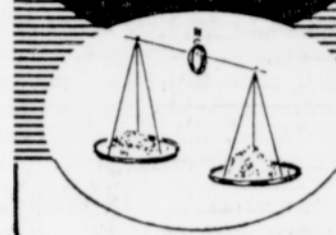

Chukar Partridge Now in Seventeen Oregon Counties

Two sight records during 1954 and a substantial release in 1955 in Deschutes county brought the total to 17 counties in which chukar partridge are known to occur. Since 1951, a total of 43,110 chukars have been released in suitable habitat throughout eastern Oregon. The 1955 liberations amounted to 11,501 birds, 5,949 of which were adult birds.

The heaviest known populations are to be found in areas along the Deschutes river canyon where several flocks of 150 or more have been reported. Other good populations of chukars can be found in the John Day country, especially the north fork, the Malheur and Owyhee rivers, Hart mountain and Abert River. It appears that the birds have become established in portions of these areas but not to be considered as particularly abundant in any one locality.

A total of 29 complete broods was recorded during the summer of 1954. These contained a total of 328 chicks or an average of 11.3 chicks per brood.

Though conditions for nesting have been good during the past nesting season, no hunting on the introduced Asiatics is anticipated within the immediate future.

Hunters are urged by the game commission to be on the lookout for the birds and not to shoot them for Hungarian partridge. They are similar in color but larger. The free game commission pamphlet "Oregon's Upland Game Birds" contains a description of the bird and other game birds found in the state.

Either Sex' Elk Drawings Held

About 60 interested nimrods were on hand at the Oregon Game Commission's Portland office on October 6 to witness the special either sex elk drawings.

A total of 22,587 persons filed applications. Of this number, 1,197 applications were rejected for infractions of the drawing regulations.

Many Too Late

Of the number rejected, 318 applications arrived too late to be eligible for the drawing. Errors on the applications blanks accounted for the remainder of the rejections. Some of these errors included omitting of license numbers, lack of address and failing to sign the application blank.

Both Ineligible

A member of a hunting party of four who witnessed the drawing was extremely disappointed when it was learned that the principal applicant of his party had also applied with another group of hunters on another blank. Needless to say, both parties became ineligible. However, the machine drawing showed that the first group of hunters would have been successful in obtaining permits.

Most of the controlled hunts in northeastern Oregon will extend from November 11 through November 23, running concurrent with the latter part of the general elk season. The Elgin hunt will be from October 29 through November 21, and the Cottonwood Creek hunt will be from December 17 through December 22.

In western Oregon the Tillamook hunt will be November 19 and 20, the Clatsop hunt, December 17 and 18.

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Phasant Liberations Are Almost Complete

Phasant liberations were all but completed during the month of September with 29,750 birds released throughout the state in the past two and a half months, according to Vic Masson, chief of upland game, Oregon Game Commission.

From the E. E. Wilson game farm, 14,541 birds were released in suitable habitat mostly in western Oregon counties. Approximately 2,500 adult cocks remain at the farm to be released in the Willamette valley just prior to the season opener.

At the Ontario game farm 15,209 birds were released with the birds going to eastern Oregon counties where phasant habitat is available.

Grovers Lose First Grid Game Of Season 26-12 to Prineville

Cottage Grove High's gridmen lost their first game of the season breaking a string of five consecutive victories. Friday night in the sloppy field of Prineville as the Cowboys romped over Grove 26-12.

Cottage Grove scored in the second and third quarters, both times by Jim Nichols. Trailing 13-0, the Lions scored their initial TD when Nichols intercepted a Cowboy pass and scooted 75 yards for the score. In the third period CG ended the game's scoring with a touchdown drive by taking to the field, Leon Hayes threw a series of short passes to Myrl Dilbeck, then flicked a pass to Nichols for seven yards and the score.

The Cowboys, picked by many to take the state A-2 title this year, scored twice in the first quarter and led the rest of the way.

Early Lead

Prineville took over from Cottage Grove early in the game and went 58 yards in five plays for the touchdown. Dale Shumway went the final 15 yards and Wayne Demaris added the bonus.

Shortly after this Prineville recovered a Lion fumble, and in ten plays again hit paydirt, with Jerry Quinn carrying the PAT field.

With only seconds remaining in the first half, quarterback Bill Parrish tossed a pass to Charles Houghbanks, who went the rest of the 60 yards for the TD.

Prineville's biggest lead came in the third period, when the Cowboys held a 26-6 bulge. Capping a long drive, Richard Duff went ten

Waterfowl Boost To Aid Hunters

Waterfowl gunners can look for a good season opener if the buildup in duck and geese populations continues to increase.

According to the game commission, northern flights are beginning to arrive in good numbers throughout the state with large populations building up in the marshlands of Klamath, Lake and Harney counties. A smaller buildup is also noted in the Willamette valley and the coastal plains.

The largest influx took place at Summer Lake where the latest flyway count shows about 32,000 birds in the area. Snow geese, white-fronted geese, baldpate and green-winged teal predominate in the early flights. Pintails, baldpate, shoveler and mallard predominate in the Klamath, Willamette and coastal areas.

Hunters are urged to be on the lookout for banded birds when the season opens October 22 and to return the information to the proper authorities. Approximately 3,000 birds have been banded by the commission this past month, mostly in the Summer Lake, Sauvies Island and Nehalem Bay areas.

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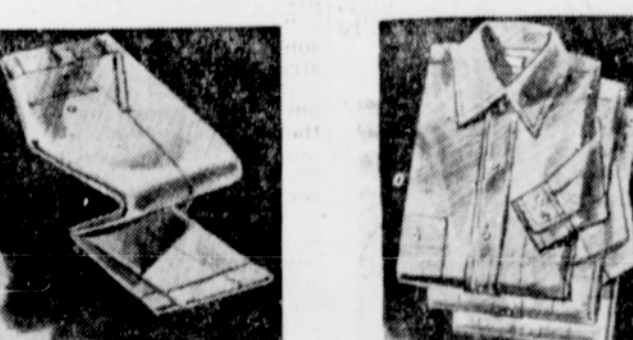
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
