(Continued from Page One) the new for the few years of use we could get out of it."

Looking At Future

The study that went into the formation of the present plan was made with the needs of the county now and 20 years from now in mind, the commissioners said. Future acquisition of land to the east will provide for a 50 year expansion plan.

"All department heads were interviewed to determine their needs now and for years in the future," Commissioner Straub explained. "The public use of each department was studied when we considered the parking needs. The plan as it now stands provides ample parking, easy access, and will prevent encroachment of business and commercial building. We will have an efficient, economical and attractive building in a park setting we can all be proud of."

The proposal will go through after the October 31 hearing unless a sufficient number of citizens object by petition. By law, the petition must bear the signatures of at least two per cent of the persons who voted for governor in the last election.

County Commissioner Kenneth Neilsen stopped by The Sentinel shortly before press-time and wished to emphasize that the October 31 hearing is the time and place set by the board of commissioners to receive alternate plans. If no petitions are received, he stated, commissioners are then authorized to start destruction of the old building and construction of the new courthouse immediately.

"The present building has many years of use remaining and can be used for housing and county departments now in rented quarters," stated Neilsen.

The crux of the petitions now being circulated, Neilsen added, is as follows: "As an alternate to said proposals, we propose that a new county court house be erected without the destruction and abandonment of the present county court house building."

Commissioners and members of the Citizens Advisory Committee said they will welcome questions and comments on the building program between now and the public hearing.

(Continued from Page One) mission on Intergovernmental Relations; and O. W. Campbell, city manager of San Diego and president of the League of California Cities. Governor Paul L. Patterson will address the annual banquet.

In addition to the section for small cities, there will be sessions devoted to a discussion of municipal finance and personnel, planning and zoning, fire protection, public works, parks and recreation, and there will be special group meetings for city attorneys, finance officers, municipal judges, building inspectors, recreation directors, police chiefs and fire chiefs.

The League was organized at a meeting held in Portland on January 24, 1925. It has grown to an organization representing 208 of the state's 216 active cities. Eight of the ten surviving founders will join with city officials in observance of the 30th anniversary. To be honored at the convention also will be the past presidents of the League and all city officials and employees who have completed 30 years of municipal service.

The actual strength of the Marine Corps at the close of the year 1907 was 26 officers and 729 enlisted men. The Act of March 3, 1909, increased the officers in the Corps and brought the authorized strength of the enlisted personnel up to 1,823.
