\$396,142 Boost Given Oregon For Wildlife

Oregon federal aid projects for the restoration and development of the sport fishery and wildlife resource will have a banner year in 1956 with an operating base of \$396,142 it was learned today. The money is Oregon's share of the \$16,537,900 of federal aid funds to be apportioned to the 48 states as announced by the Secretary of the Interior.

Under the Pittman-Robertson act, which provides for an excise tax on sporting arms and ammunition, Oregon's share in the apportionment amounts to \$288,985; the monies to be used for wildlife restoration programs.

The 10 per cent excise tax on fishing tackle under the Dingell-Johnson act brought a return to the state of \$107,157 to be used for sport fishery projects.

As proscribed in the Pittman-Robertson act for wildlife and the Dingell-Johnson act for sport fish, investments are made so that benefits go to hunters and fishermen who seek recreation and food from the nation's fields and streams.

To obtain the benefits of the federal grants, the states submit project proposals to the Fish and Wildlife Service. Such proposals may consist of surveys, investigations, land acquisitions, land and water development, management of restoration areas, and maintenance of completed areas. Approval of the projects are given if they are found to be substantial in character and design.

The state fish and game departments proceed to carry out the plans, spending their own funds, and are then reimbursed 75 per cent of the project cost. The remaining 25 per cent of the cost

Lake 'O Woods Rotenoned

Fish populations in Lake of the Woods are now a thing of the past for the present at least.

On September 21, a working crew of nearly 250 game commission personnel, horse owners around the lake, and sportsmen from Klamath Falls, Ashland, Medford and Grants Pass saturated the lake with rotenone, the fish killing chemical, to remove the conglomeration of fish life which populated the lake.

Blessed with clear weather, the crews started at dawn, and most of the chemical application had been completed by noon. Mopping up operations of the small swamp areas continued in the afternoon.

John Dimick, game commission biologist in charge of the operation, stated "There is little possibility that any fish escaped the poisoning. Few trout were killed simply because there were few trout in the lake. The greatest populations consist of carp, bullheads and perch."

Three days following the treatment, reports disclosed that fish were piling up in windrows along the beaches. The conglomeration included warmouth, bluegill and pumpkinseed sunfish, bullhead, perch, bass, crappie, suckers and carp. Only the carp had been able to reach any size as attested by the 19 1/2 pounder that floated to shore shortly after the operation got under way and by the thousands more floating on the surface by midmorning.

If the toxic effect of the rotenone wears off rapidly enough, the lake will be restocked this fall with 130,000 rainbow fingerlings. If not, planting will be delayed until next spring.

of the project is financed out of regular department funds.

Some of the more important projects which have been carried out in Oregon under the wildlife restoration acts have been the acquisition, development, and activation of the Sauvie Island and Summer Lake public shooting areas, the rehabilitation of Diamond Lake and Lake of the Woods, and the acquisition and development of the White River, John Day, and Wenaha big game winter ranges. The re-establishment of highborn mountain sheep in the Hart mountain area of Oregon was also carried out under auspices of the federal acts.

Lions Return to Winning Ways On 46-13 Win Over St. Francis

Cottage Grove got back in the win column last week when the Lions rolled over a hapless St. Francis grid crew 46-13 Friday night at Civic Stadium in Eugene.

Grove, turning over the substitute bench, placed points in every quarter, aggregating 353 yards rushing and 66 passing. The Lions jumped into a two touchdown lead over the Saints, a strong A-2 school, in the first quarter and glided to an easy win.

The Lions' first score started from a drive on the CG 4-yard marker, where a Saint punt rolled dead. In four plays, aided by Dean Castle's long end runs, Grove hit the Saints' 49-yard line. From here Jim Nichols squeezed through guard and tackle and scooted the balance for 6. He added the PAT for a Grove 7-0 lead.

A minute later Larry Burleson fell on a Saint fumble on the Eugene team's 14. A 10-yard loss only made Don Heck's statue-of-liberty scoring run more spectacular. Nichols' bonus effort gave Grove a 14-0 bulge.

Scoring done by St. Francis was done on long end runs. In the first quarter, Bob Trichel broke loose from his 29-yard line and romped around end for the Saints' first score. In the third quarter a 75-yard pass play from Bruna Barbison to Trichel netted a TD for the Saints. Trichel caught the pass on his 40 and outtraced the Lion safety and added the bonus.

Grove scoring in the second quarter was thwarted by penalties several times and once on a dropped pass. Quarterback Leon Hayes flipped a spiral to Burleson, standing all alone and lonely on the Saint 10, but the ball was too heavy and he dropped a sure TD.

Grove Scores

With 45 seconds to go in the first half, Grove scored its third TD on a 12-yard pass play from Hayes to Myrl Dilbeck. Nichols converted and the half ended with the ball in CG's possession, following Hayes' pass interception and 20 yard return.

A couple of JV backs showed up well in the second half. On the first play Jerry Northcutt romped for 21 yards, then Jim Hoover took over and added another 21 on two carries. A fumble gave St. Francis the ball, but the Saints were forced to kick. On the first play Hoover scampered 34 yards, eluding several tacklers nicely. Northcutt added another 7 and veteran halfback Byron Angell romped the remaining 16 yards for the TD.

Grove scored early in the fourth period when Castle took off around end and rolled 55 yards for the score. Angell had previously brought the ball from the 32 to the 45.

Saints Lose Ball

St. Francis lost the ball two plays later when Childers intercepted a pass on the Saint 40. Hoover ran it to the 29, where Northcutt took over for a 29-yard gallop inside end for the score. Childers added the PAT.

The last scoring threat of St. Francis was squelched by Heck's pass interception on the Grove 20. Two plays later Northcutt grabbed the pigskin, faked out the safety beautifully and scooted 73 yards for the game's final score.

Cottage Grove High's JV and Frosh teams suffered setbacks during the past week, as the Eugene Sophomores beat Grove's Frosh 14-0 and the Eugene JV's outpointed the local JV gridders 19-12 on the Eugene turf.

Eugene led all the way in Monday's Jayvee tilt. A 15 yard pass play netted the little Axemen a TD in the first quarter. Eugene's second scoring effort, idling them a 12-0 margin, came in the third quarter on another pass. Their last touchdown came in the last quarter on an end run.

Grove scored both touchdowns from center backs by Wes Johnson. Darrell White snared a pass set up the first TD and Johnson's 35 yard run led to the second score.

In the Frosh game Thursday Cottage Grove had two touchdowns plays nullified by penalties. On one Clark Peterson intercepted a pass and raced for the score and on the other Bob Foote, who shone brightest on both offense and defense for the locals, galloped 75 yards into paydirt.

Eugene's scores came in the first and third periods. On the first the Axemen recovered a Grove fumble at the 12 yard line and in the second on an intercepted pass, Eugene missed both PAT's but garnered a safety for the balance points.

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
