700 Attend Diamond Jubilee Celebration of Eastern Star

This is believed to have been the largest fraternal gathering ever held in Cottage Grove. The gymnasium was transformed into a modern setting for the occasion by a committee headed by Mrs. Lois Mills. A semi-circular raised stage covered with green carpeting was the focal point of the room, at each side of which were huge black and glitter shadow boxes containing life-sized figures dressed in gowns of the style of 1880 and 1955.

The Women's Christian Temperance Union will meet at 2 p.m. Thursday, November 3, at the Church of God. Those interested are invited to attend.

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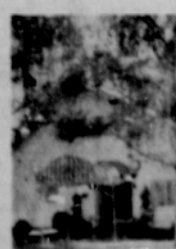

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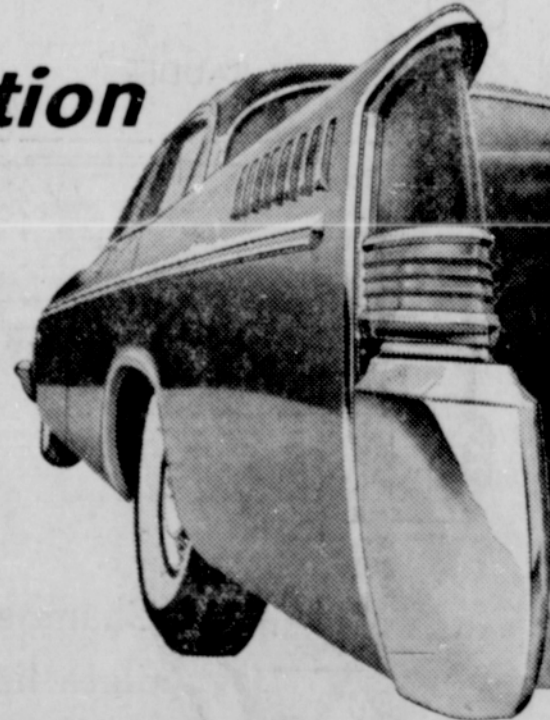
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
