

Lions Bop Lebanon 33-7 After First Quarter Score

Facing a 7-0 deficit at the end of the first quarter, and prospects of a big upset by the hands of the Warriors, Cottage Grove racked up three TD's in the second quarter and rolled on to a 33-7 win over winless Lebanon Friday night on the Warrior turf.

Lebanon scored early in the initial quarter which the Warriors dominated, after Dean Castle fumbled, the host team recovered on Grove's eight, and pushed over a TD and conversion. Lebanon had received the kickoff and wasted no time heading for CG's goal line. The Warriors' drive ran out of gas on the 10, where Grove took over and fumbled away the touchdown on a Wells to Snyder pass.

Lions Roar Back.
Early in the second stanza the Lions roared back, with three scoring efforts. A 54-yard drive carried Grove to the Warrior 88, where quarterback Leon Hayes fired a perfect strike to halfback Jim Nichols in the end zone and flicked another pass to Byron

Angell for the PAT.

Cottage Grove moved ahead in the contest, after marching 50 yards via the ground route, when Castle bawled over from the four into pay dirt. The PAT failed.

Still in the second period, Cottage Grove scored again on a sustained 80-yard drive. Hayes sneaked over for the score and

Cottage Grove's powerful grid squad winds up its 1955 season Friday on Curran Field, where the Lions tangle with Sweet Home's Huskies. Sweet Home has a better crew than Lebanon, which gave Grove a first quarter scare, but the Lions should be able to subdue the Huskies without a supreme effort.

Should Cottage Grove defeat Sweet Home, the Lions will rack up one of its most successful games in recent history, equal to the teams of '44, '45 and '48. The win would give Grove an eight-win-one-loss record for the season.

Nichols ran the end for the bonus marker, giving the Lions a 20-7 half-time bulge.

Hoover Scores.
Another long march, topped by Jim Hoover's 6-yard scamper, gave Grove its fourth score in the third quarter. Nichols booted the PAT.

A 44-yard aerial from Hayes to Myrl Dilbeck finished off the scoring (as well as Lebanon) late in the final canto, giving the Lions a 7 wins to one loss record or the season, with one remaining game. Sweet Home's Huskies travel to Cottage Grove for the season closer Friday night.

Barrier Removed On Sixes River

Salmon and steelhead will find easier access to the upper reaches of Sixes river in Curry county following removal of a rock barrier this past week by the Coos Bay Lumber company in cooperation with the state game commission.

A huge rock behind which log jams frequently have formed was blasted apart by a Coos Bay Lumber company crew working with Walt Ryckman, game commission stream clearance supervisor. The lumber company also provided the equipment and material necessary to do the job. The rock barrier was located about 25 miles above highway 101.

The lumber company has also cleaned out many of the tributaries of the Sixes above the point where the rock barrier was removed.

According to the commission high water will wash out the remainder of the rock. Many additional miles of spawning area will be more accessible to migratory fish.

Stanford Next for Oregon Webfoots With Win Streak of Four Straight

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON Eugene (Special) — "Just about everybody we used looked good," was the postmortem of Len Casanova, Sunday, as he and his aids reviewed Oregon's 35-0 conquest of Washington State.

With a winning streak stretched new to four games, longest since the 1948 Oregon Cotton Bowl team bunched seven wins in a row, the Ducks, nevertheless, will find themselves behind the eight-ball again next weekend when they take on Stanford's amazing Indians.

Defensively, the Webfoots encountered little that they hadn't been looking for and came out of it with their second straight shut-out. In tabbing players, if any one of them at all, Casanova leaned to the superb playing of halfback Dick James, who was a definite standout for the second week in a row.

Comparative scores, if they count, will definitely favor Chuck Taylor's Indians over Oregon. The Palo Alto force came up with one of the bigger upsets of the 1955 PCY season last week when they took Southern California's Trojans, 28-20. These same Trojans were early season winners, 42-15, against Oregon.

But against the Trojans, Oregon finished with an even "nothing" in the passing column, a department that has found them steadily improving along the season. With Tom Crabtree looking more and more like a find T-formation quarterback and the brilliant speed of the Ducks definitely asserting itself, Oregon may be able to give Stanford a lot more than they showed against USC.

From a historical standpoint Oregon will be after more than just another win against the Indians. For it was Chuck Taylor's outfit that dumped Oregon's 1954 Ducks, 18-13, and practically before the season had started, ruined any chances of what was predicted to be a fine year at Oregon.

With OSC perched in sole possession of second place in the Pacific Coast conference standings and California tied for sixth, the Beavers will enter the contest slight favorites. However, injury reports in Beaver land and scouting reports from Cal's slaughter of Washington last weekend tend to nullify early season performances.

Bears. In 1946 Dick Twenge, now freshman grid coach at OSC, had one of his greatest days and the Beavers won, 23-7. Since that year California has been all victorious over the Orangemen.

The Beavers will place on the block their chance to post the best conference record in the history of the school if the Beavers can get past Cal and Oregon they will finish with a 6-1-0 conference mark. In 1934 and 1946 OSC posted 6-1-1 marks.

The imminent problem of topping California will depend largely on the progress of sophomore tailback Joe Francis, who is nursing a bone chip in the left wrist and a severely bruised right shoulder. Francis did not suit up for OSC's win over Idaho, and

Fish Control Job On Malheur Done

One of the most ambitious rough fish control projects ever attempted was completed recently by a game commission crew working on the Malheur river system.

Led by Larry Bishce, game commission fishery agent in the south-east region, the crew chemically treated approximately 250 miles of stream. Included in the project were nine reservoirs embracing 3,800 acre feet. Major reservoirs are not recovering as rapidly as expected. Fullback Ario Wenstrand is definitely out of the Cal game and probably will miss the finale with Oregon.

Wingback Sam Wesley saw limited duty against Idaho, but should be set for California, as will tackle John Witte, downed with a hip point. Wesley's understudy, senior Dick Mason, ramblled for an 80-yard punt return and an eight-yard end sweep to score twice against Idaho.

The Beavers will leave Friday night by train from Albany, and will return by train after the game Saturday night.

in the Malheur system are Beulah, Warm Springs, and Malheur. Used in the operation were 17,000 pounds of dry rotenone powder and more than 400 gallons of liquid rotenone. The entire operation covered a period from August 26 to October 14.

Chemical treatment was preceded by surveys to determine the upstream limits of trash fish distribution. Suckers, squawfish, and carp were the principal culprits. Some rainbow trout were killed, but the trout population should recover rapidly in the absence of rough fish competition. Restocking will take place next year.

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
