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National Stamp Collecting Week November 14-20

Stamp collectors of South Lane and North Douglas counties will celebrate National Stamp Collecting Week starting November 14, when the South Lane Stamp society presents a special observance of the week at its meeting November 10 in the clubroom of the Cottage Grove city library at 7:30 p.m.

National Stamp Collecting Week 1955 will memorialize the life and times of Theodore Roosevelt, and will be celebrated in conjunction with the issuance of a new 6-cent stamp bearing a portrait of the 26th president of the United States, soldier, naturalist, conservationist. The stamp will be released in New York November 18, in conjunction with the opening of the Seventh National Postage Stamp Show.

National Stamp Collecting Week 1955 also will be devoted to furthering the interest of non-collectors in the hobby and in stressing the hobby's many advantages, educational, cultural and beneficial. Programs have been planned by many stamp collecting groups all over the nation in observance of the week.

Stamp collecting, as honored by National Stamp Collecting week, November 14 through 20, is the hobby of millions around the world, interesting both "kids and kings," according to Mrs. Martha Bonar, president of the South Lane Stamp Society. "The hobby is almost as old as the stamps themselves," stated Mrs. Bonar. "The first adhesive postage stamps appeared in England in 1840, and our hobby dates from just about that time. Since then, thousands of stamps have appeared, and many millions of collectors have been developed. We hope that the citizens of this area will join us at our meeting on Thursday evening."

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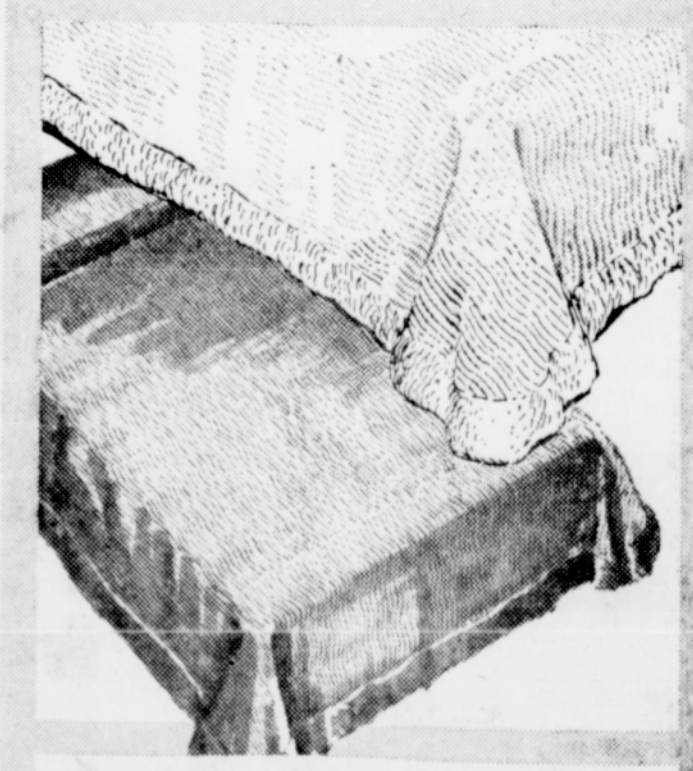
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
