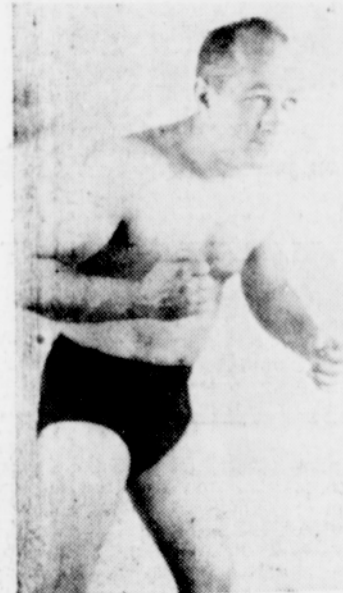
Owyhee Ramp Now Completed

Easy access to the Owyhee reservoir is now available to boatmen and fishermen.

According to Ted Howell, Oregon Game Commission representative who inspected the area last week, the Pacific Concrete Company of Portland was in the process of pouring the last section of concrete slab to the access boat ramp. The retaining wall was already completed. Barring complications, the boat ramp was to have been ready for public use by the second November weekend.

The launching ramp is approximately 600 feet in length, 20 feet wide, and 6 inches thick and is located on the east side of the reservoir about half way between the dam and the old boat lift. Car and trailer parking areas are located above the launching site.

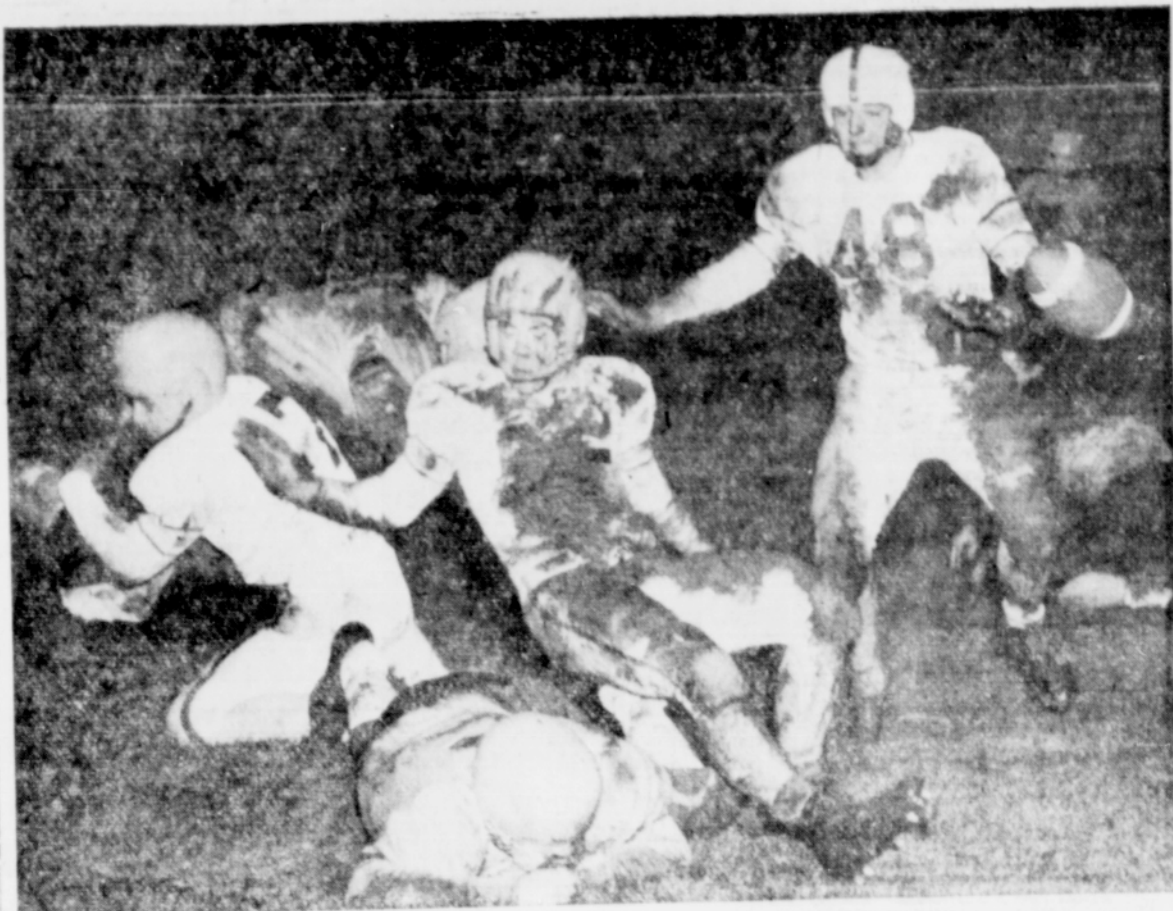

Salmon, Steelhead At South Umpqua Have New Freeway

With the new freeway recently completed, migrating salmon and steelhead will no longer find the South Umpqua falls a rocky road to travel in their upstream journey to the spawning grounds.

According to George Kernan, chief engineer, Oregon Game Commission, the new fishway by-passing the falls and allowing easy access to the upper reaches is completed and ready for use by migrating fish life. Salmon, steelhead, and other fish life can now ascend the 20-foot elevation by a series of 12-foot pools with a rise of only 12 inches from one pool to the next.

The South Umpqua falls has long been a stumbling block to migrating fish, and only at certain stages of high water were salmon, steelhead and other fish able to pass. During extreme low water flows all fish were forced to remain below the falls, seriously reducing the number of fish which were able to spawn successfully. The new ladder will allow passage of fish life at all stages of water flow, enabling fish to reach the vast spawning reaches in the headwaters.

Rare Bird Bagged At Summer Lake

Rare, indeed, was the bird in the bag of a waterfowl hunter at Summer Lake last week.

Stymied at the strange appearance of the brownish colored duck, he had shot and thinking it was some kind of black duck, the hunter brought the bird to the checking station where Austin Hamer, game commission information agent, identified the stranger as a juvenile white-winged scoter, the first scoter ever to be recorded at the Summer Lake station.

Because of its rare occurrence at Summer Lake, the hunter donated the bird to Vernon Maw, Summer Lake waterfowl biologist, who will mount the bird and add it to the Summer Lake collection.

Before the day was through, two more of the scoters were checked through the station, with the hunters reporting having seen a flock of at least 15 of the large, blackish, colored waterfowl.

Normally the scoters are a sea bird, spending most of their time along the coast and the coastal bays and inlets. Nesting, however, usually takes place inland on large bodies of water, with the greatest nesting taking place in northern Canada and Alaska. In the fall they migrate back to the coastal areas wintering from Alaska to California.

White-winged scoters have been recorded by hunters several times in the past at Klamath Lake. This is the first time they have been recorded during the hunting season as far inland as Summer Lake.

Rotary Screens Again Prove Good

As in the past, rotary screens installed on northeast Oregon streams are proving their worth in safely by-passing salmon, steelhead, and trout from irrigation canals and ditches.

With the peak of the downstream migrant salmon and steelhead now in full swing, records are piling up as to the number of fish which have been prevented from entering the canals and becoming lost in the small laterals.

According to Homer Campbell, northeast fishery biologist, Oregon Game Commission, a tremendous increase in the number of downstream migrant salmon has been noted on the Imnaha river where at only two screens more than 30,000 have been tallied through the by-pass trap. An increase in downstream migrants of both salmon and steelhead has also been noted on Eagle creek in Baker county.

From September 15 through October 15 at six rotary screen check points on the Imnaha and Lostine rivers and on Eagle and Sheep creeks, more than 32,400 salmon and 3,800 steelhead were counted through the trap, a tremendous saving to sport fishermen.

At the present time the Oregon Game Commission has in operation approximately 725 rotary screens on irrigation ditches and power canals throughout the state. Each one is an important factor in the prevention of migrant fish losses.

Cottage Grove Caps Football Season With 6-0 Victory Over Sweet Home

Proving that Huskies are more at home with the wind and snow than Lions, Sweet Home almost tipped over the strongly favored Cottage Grove grid machine Friday night on Currin Field, but the Grovers came through with a tally in the third quarter and held the reins on the Huskies to eke out a 6-0 victory.

The win capped one of Cottage Grove's most successful football seasons, with eight wins and only one loss, bowing only to a powerful Prineville team in mid-October.

Sweet Home scored on the first play of the game, when quarterback Jerry McDaniels broke through the middle and munched 80 yards into pay snow, but the play was nullified by an offside penalty and the Huskies never threatened again.

Lone Tally

Not until the third quarter did Grove's some 1,000 chilled homecoming fans have anything to cheer about. Taking over on the Sweet Home 48 the Lions began to slobber in a hurry.

Dean Castle plowed for 10 yards before Deacon Camme slid through the middle for 33 yards and he was pulled down on the five. The last man in Grove's 1-2-3 scoring punch, Jim Nichols, grabbed the ball from here and plowed over for the tally.

Currin Field was a mud bowl by halftime. It began snowing in the second quarter and by the end of the contest an inch and a half covered the turf.

Grove Threatens

The Lions had threatened once before but lost the ball on a fumble on the one-yard marker. Starting from their own 41, CG drove to the one, where quarterback Leon Hayes' handoff to Nichols went awry and was pounced on by the Huskies.

Both teams fumbled considerably and could make little headway during the balance of the game. Cottage Grove, however, had the decided edge on rushing yardage, piling up 234 yards to Sweet Home's 86, mostly on the running of Castle, Crammer and Nichols. CG also led on first downs 13-4.
