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Deer Hunters Given 2nd Try

Unsuccessful deer hunters will have another chance to fill their tags this coming week end.

According to the Oregon Game Commission, on November 26 and 27, hunters with unused deer tags will be allowed to hunt for one deer of either sex throughout the agricultural areas of the Willamette valley.

Hunters are cautioned that unlike the general either sex season in the Willamette valley when extensive private timberlands were open, the November 26 and 27 hunt is limited to within one mile of established agricultural lands.

Open areas are: Established agricultural lands and adjacent areas within one mile in Clackamas, Columbia, Marion, Multnomah, Washington, Yamhill, Polk, Benton, Linn, and Lane counties.

The bag limit is one deer of either sex for those hunters possessing an unused deer tag.

Game Commission Pens Air Waves

In an effort to bring more wildlife news to hunters, fishermen, and other outdoor users, the Oregon Game Commission recently inaugurated a series of weekly 15-minute public service programs for use on the air waves throughout the state.

Called "The Game Commission Bulletin of the Air" the program series is now being played by 30 radio stations.

Under the direction of Ron Shay, who not only graduated from Oregon State College with a degree in wildlife management, but also studied radio and radio broadcasting at KOAC, Corvallis, the series is well under way with 15 programs completed. Fourteen of these have already been aired by radio stations.

On the premise that a well informed public is a cooperative public, the general theme of the program series highlights the commission activities in the management of Oregon's wildlife. Each program attempts to explain some phase or answer some question in the management of fish and game.

A portable tape recorder is used to record on-the-spot activities whether it be taking eggs for fish hatchery production, taking elk census and herd composition high on a wind-swept ridge, or dynamiting a log jam to allow migrating fish to pass. Most programs will take the listener behind the scenes to show the why, when, and where of game management.

Interested persons who wish to know more about their fish and wildlife are urged to consult their newspaper for the day and time of "The Game Commission Bulletin of the Air."

General Elk Season Closes

Elk hunters are reminded by the game commission that except for special permit hunts in two areas, the general elk season in Oregon closed at sundown Wednesday, November 23.

The only elk seasons remaining after that date will be the Clatsop and Cottonwood creek controlled hunts scheduled for December.

In the Clatsop area, 400 permit holders who drew tags in the special elk drawings held in October will be allowed to hunt for one elk of either sex on December 17 and 18. The Cottonwood creek controlled hunt is scheduled for December 17 through December 22 for the taking of one elk of either sex. Three hundred permits were issued for the Cottonwood creek hunt in Umatilla county.

All permits for these controlled hunts were issued during the special elk hunt drawings held at the commission's Portland office on October 6. Hunters are cautioned that these permits are non-transferable and cannot be used except by the person to whom the permit was issued.

Chemist Has Grant From Can Co.

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—An Oregon State college chemist has received a \$9000 grant for a three-year study of corrosion inside tin cans.

The research by Dr. W. H. Slabaugh will provide new information on how gases within the can—air, carbon dioxide and water vapors—go through the protective lacquer film cover and corrode the metal underneath.

It may help too in the future development of tin cans without tin. Can companies and national defense leaders are interested in "tinless" cans because while the United States uses more tin than the rest of the world put together, it depends entirely on foreign sources of supplies.

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Since these supplies might be cut off in time of national emergency, research is being pushed on using other materials such as specially treated steel, aluminum, zinc, and possibly nickel. Slabaugh's research grant is from the American Can company, New York.

In the OSC study, metals coated with various protective films will be graded on corrosion performance. A highly-sensitive spring balance will be used to "weigh" the amount of gas diffusion through the protective film.
