Oregon Publisher Subject of Book

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene (Special)—A biography of George Putnam, editor and publisher of the Salem Capital Journal from 1919-1953, has just been published in a book entitled "An Oregon Crusader." Author is George S. Turnbull, former journalism dean here.

Putnam's continuous campaigns to "expose everything that is crooked and to support everything that is sincere and right" are featured in the 250-page book which was published by Binford and Mort of Portland. Many direct quotations from Putnam's editorials are included in the work.

Author of the Putnam story recently returned to the school of journalism here to do research on Oregon journalism. Turnbull taught at the university for 31 years, retiring in 1949.

William Miller Asst. Minister Ashland Church



William (Bill) Miller, graduate of the local high school with the class of '49 and of San Jose Bible college in '55, is now serving as assistant pastor of the First Church of Christ at Ashland.

Miller received his degree in bachelor of theology at San Jose Bible college.

During high school here, he was a member of the Honor Society and active in the Crusaders for Christ of which he was president. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Miller.

Miller also is attending Southern Oregon College of Education at Ashland in addition to his ministerial work, and he is youth leader for the Intermediate young people of the church. He has filled the pulpit at Klamath Falls and Central Point during absences of the regular ministers.

Three other young men, all graduates of the local high school and San Jose Bible college, either are preaching or continuing their studies preparing for the ministry. They are Lloyd Hosman, Jerry McCormack and Roy Aubrey.

Lloyd Hosman, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Hosman, graduated in '55 with Miller and received Bachelor of Theology and Bachelor of Sacred Music degrees. He served as assistant pastor at the local church during the past two summers.

Hosman has charge of the music department and teaches Old Testament poetry at Boise Bible college, and is attending Nazarene college at Nampa.

Jerry McCormack, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred McCormack, now of Roseburg, is minister of the Church of Christ at Beecher City, Ill., and assists as pianist in evangelistic services.

FFA News

LIVING TO SERVE

This week I want to continue along the line of officers of the Future Farmers of America organization. Questions that may be asked are: What are qualifications for office? Who is eligible for office? How is one recommended for office?

Beginning with the local chapter, any boy who has paid his dues, carries a farm project, and has earned the degree of chapter farmer is in line for a chapter office. Scholastic ability, leadership, character and cooperation are among other outstanding qualities that are looked for in a would-be officer. In the local chapter, the nominating committee consists of the chapter executive committee.

On the state level, any boy who has paid his dues, carries a farm project, and has earned the degree of state farmer, is eligible for a state office. The same qualities are looked for in the state office as in the local chapter.

In each district there are two boys—who have received the state farmer degree, that are nominated to be interviewed by the nominating committee for a state office. The nominating committee consists of a group of delegates to the state convention picked by the executive committee. Each would-be officer is asked to give a brief outline of the history of the organization and must know the main points of the creed and aims and purposes of the organization.

Those nominated by the committee are presented to the delegation. The delegation then nominates from the floor and elects officers. Usually those nominated by the committee are elected to office.

The national officers are chosen as the leaders of the organization and must be outstanding as a leader, and public relations man. The would-be officers must have paid his dues, carry a farm project and have earned the degree of American farmer. When making out application for American farmer, the individual states whether he would or would not want to become a national officer. The state advisors study

each application and make their recommendations for the boy for an office.

At the convention the boy is interviewed by the nominating committee that consists of state delegates to the convention. The boy is interviewed three times. First is for his project and himself. The second for his knowledge of the organization and the third for his knowledge of parliamentary procedure.

Those passed by the nominating committee are presented to the delegation. There is one boy nominated to each office. The delegation then nominates from the floor and elects the national officers.
