## Lions Hear High School Course Sex Relation Talk

(Delayed)

R. L. Dusenberry, high school principal, was the principal speaker at the program hour of the local Lions club November 17 and discussed the course in sex education and threw the subject open for discussion by various club members after his talk. Mr. Dusenberry stated the program or course as set up here several years ago might need revision. The course has been frequently talked about among the various faculty members in an effort to better the course and make it more understood.

The speaker said there had been some misconception about what is taught in this course and some people evidently suspect that some of the material used is questionable. However, material to be used is approved by the local ministerial association.

The problem of sex education is a grave one, Mr. Dusenberry admits and deserves consideration by both parents and the schools. One of the difficulties of such a course

as it applies to the local area, is that the wrong course in the wrong area may be taught and efforts are constantly being made to make the necessary adjustments to fit local conditions, he said.

When the subject was thrown open to an open forum, the question of the conduct of school pupils outside the schools was discussed and Mr. Dusenberry believes this is one of the most difficult problems facing the educators because they can do so little about it. Adolescent drinking came in for its share of discussion but not sign a warrant for the arrest of those guilty of selling liquor to a minor. Mr. Dusenberry said the high school had had fine cooperation from the local police, but little or no cooperation from outside officials, where the offense occurred outside of the city limits.

## Wendell McCargar Drowned When Boat Capsizes

No trace of the body of Wendell H. McCargar, former Cottage Grove resident drowned Sunday when his fishing boat capsized in Smith river, near Crescent City, Calif., had been found by Wednesday noon. His sister, Mrs. Alvis Wicks, of Drain, was contacted then by telephone shortly before press time.

Mr. McCargar, a Crescent City super market owner, and a fishing partner, Robert Young, were fishing when their boat capsized about noon in Peacock hole of Smith river. Mr. Young was treated for shock and exposure at a Crescent City hospital.

Sheriff's deputies in the area are dragging the treacherous waters for the body. Two brothers of the drowned man, Ray (Joe) and Dana McCargar, are among the searchers. The widow and three children survive.

## Car Takes to Ditch, Hits Power Pole

LONDON A Saturday night power outage that lasted most of the night November 19 was caused when Jack Anderson of Cottage Grove took to the ditch to avoid another car stalled on the wrong side of the road near the Palki place, and hit a power pole. ## Facts About Tuberculosis

Tuberculosis is a chronic disease caused by a germ, the tubercle bacillus. It can attack any part of the body, but the most common form, pulmonary tuberculosis, affects the lungs.

Tuberculosis can be prevented—yet an estimated 400,000 Americans have active TB, 601 of them in Oregon. Twenty-seven NEW cases were reported in the county this year.

Tuberculosis can be cured—yet approximately 17,000 Americans died of TB last year, 84 of them in Oregon, six in Lane County—63 so far this year in Oregon.

Tuberculosis can be detected in its earliest stages by chest X-ray and other tests—yet it is estimated that there are 150,000 unknown cases of TB in the United States, 250 in this state and 20 in this county.

The program of the Lane County Tuberculosis and Health Association is varied. In October and early November, many volunteers assist in preparation of Christmas Seals for mailing. Probably more than 1,000 people assisted in preparing the mail for the 49th Annual Seal Sale. This year, over 37,000 Lane County homes will receive Seals and letters of explanation.

We need to increase our income this year because of the added expense of financing the X-ray Center which is supported by Seal Sale Funds and contributions. 94¢ of every Seal Sale dollar remains in Oregon, 74¢ in Lane County.

Booths will be staffed in the different localities for the sale of Seals to people who fail to receive Seals in the mails. Coin banks and seals will be placed in some of the local business places for the convenience of patrons.

## Women Drivers Urged to Show Safety Knowledge

The safest drivers in America will increase to almost twice their present number within the next 10 years.

So says Miss Betty Skelton, Dodge test driver, who refers to the growing horde of women behind the wheel, currently 25,000,000 strong and expected to reach 47,000,000 by 1965.

"And these women are pretty good," says Betty, "and the safest drivers in America."

Betty can rattle off some pretty impressive statistics to prove her point about the safety record of the one-third of our licensed drivers who are women.

"They have only one-tenth of all the accidents," says Betty, who is the only woman test driver in the automotive industry and some, thing of a champion of the reputation of the much-maligned American woman driver.

She goes on to explain that surveys have revealed that men drive from two to four times as many miles as women. Still, the male ratio of accidents, she continues, is more than 10 times as great.

Betty hopes there will be at least one woman among the winners of the current contest in which a new car every year for life will be awarded to four safe motorists.

"It would help to establish the good reputation women drivers deserve," states the attractive young automotive expert.

"Every woman who is 21 or over and has a driver's license should enter the contest by submitting a safety slogan," she adds.

"If she is picked to be one of the contestants questioned on the Lawrence Welk show, she should brush up on safety rules and regulations. That way she will have a better chance to answer all the queries compiled by the National Safety Council," Betty advises.

She believes that a woman can and should be one of the top four whose safety know-how will win a new car every year for life.
